This Week

Utah State will open the 2002-03 season this Saturday, Nov. 23 on the road against Illinois State at 6:05 p.m. (MST). It is the second straight year that USU has opened the season on the road as the Aggies began the 2001-02 season with a 66-51 win at Montana State. It is also the third straight season that USU has played its first game of the year away from the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum as the 2000-01 team's first game was a 76-67 win over Santa Clara in the opening round of the 2000 Top of the World Classic in Fairbanks, Alaska.

About Illinois State

Illinois State will also be opening the 2002-03 season this Saturday against Utah State. The Redbirds return two starters and six lettermen from last year's team that went 17-14 on the season and finished in third-place in the Missouri Valley Conference with a 12-6 league record. Illinois State's 2001-02 season ended in the semifinals of its conference tournament with a 63-90 loss to Creighton. In its two exhibition games this year, the Redbirds defeated SIU-Edwardsville, 89-70, and lost to EA Sports, 66-65. Illinois State is picked to finish fourth in the Missouri Valley Conference this season, while senior forward Baboucarr Bojang was named to the conference's preseason team.



Next Week

Utah State will host Whitman College on Tues., Nov. 26 at the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum at 7:05 p.m. in its home opener. USU has won its last eight home openers and is 36-9 all-time in home openers dating back to the 1957-58 season. Utah State will then hit the road to compete in the 2002 Hilo Shootout in Hilo, Hawai'i over the Thanksgiving weekend. USU will open the tournament against Vermont on Fri., Nov. 29 at 8:35 p.m. (MST). The Aggies will then play Drake on Sat., Nov. 30 at 8:35 p.m. (MST), and conclude the tournament against host Hawai'i-Hilo on Sun., Dec. 1 at 6:05 p.m. (MST).

Utah State-Illinois State Series

Utah State and Illinois State will be meeting for the third time ever with the Redbirds holding a 2-0 advantage. Illinois State won the first game played between the two teams on Dec. 16, 1983 in the Indiana Classic by a final score of 80-74. The last time the two teams met was on Mar. 16, 1995 in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament in Logan, Utah. The Redbirds won that game by a final score of 93-87 in overtime. Obviously, this will be the first-ever meeting between the two teams in Normal. Here is a look at the all-time series:

Utah State Versus The Missouri Valley Conference

Utah State is 11-13 all-time against current members of the Missouri Valley Conference and will be facing a MVC team for the first time since Jan. 4, 1997 when the Aggies lost at Southern Illinois 64-67. The following is USU's record versus each current member of the Missouri Valley Conference:

Coach Morrill Versus The Missouri Valley Conference

Stew Morrill is 2-2 all-time versus current members of the Missouri Valley Conference with all four of those meetings occurring while he was the head coach at Colorado State. During his time at CSU, Morrill was 1-1 against both Drake and Creighton. The meeting against Illinois State will be his first ever. The last time Morrill coached against a MVC team was during the 1992-93 season when his CSU team defeated Creighton (77-59) and Drake (96-86) at home. During the 1991-92 season, Morrill lost at Creighton (56-62) and at Drake (40-58).

Aggies In Season Openers

Utah State is 69-28 all-time in season openers and has won eight straight dating back to the 1992-93 season. Since the 1957-58 season, USU is 6-11 in season openers on the road. The last time Utah State lost its first game of the year was on Dec. 3, 1993 when Coach Morrill's Colorado State Rams defeated USU in Ft. Collins, Colo., by a final score of 78-65.

Aggies On The Road

Over the past three years, Utah State has gone 23-12 (.657) on the road and is 25-21 on the road all-time under coach Morrill. In non-conference games, USU is 5-7 on the road under Morrill.

Aggies In Illinois

Utah State's game at Illinois State will mark the fourth time ever that a USU team has played in the state of Illinois, and USU has never won a game in the Land of Lincoln. In Utah State's three previous trips to Illinois, the Aggies have lost at Bradley (69-75), at Illinois (64-115), and at Southern Illinois (64-67).

Fast Starts

In Stew Morrill's first four years at USU, his teams have traditionally gotten off to fast starts as they are 17-3 in the first five games of each season. The 1998-99 and 2001-02 teams opened the season with five straight wins, while the 2000-01 team began the year 4-1. The 1999-2000 team was 3-2 to begin the season.

After posting its third straight 20-win season, winning its second Big West Conference regular season championship in three seasons, and advancing to its third straight postseason tournament with an appearance in the 2002 National Invitation Tournament, Utah State will be looking to make yet another run at a conference title during the 2002-03 season. Leading the way for USU will be senior forward Desmond Penigar who was named a first-team all-Big West selection as a junior as he led the Aggies in scoring (17.2) and rebounding (6.9). Other starters returning for Utah State include senior guard Ronnie Ross who averaged 7.1 points and 3.1 assists per game at the point, and senior forward Toraino Johnson who missed 10 games early in the season with a foot injury but rebounded late in the year to average 4.3 points and 3.6 rebounds per game. Along with the three returning starters, USU welcomes back five other lettermen including senior Mike Ahmad, junior Chad Evans, and sophomores Calvin Brown, Spencer Nelson and Michael Stowell. Ahmad played in all 31 games for USU as a junior and averaged 3.6 points and 2.5 rebounds. Evans, who started the first 17 games of the year, averaged 4.4 points and 3.4 rebounds. Brown appeared in 19 games and finished the year averaging 1.1 points and 1.7 assists. Stowell played in 28 games on the year and averaged 0.9 points and 0.8 rebounds per contest. Nelson, who redshirted last season after suffering a knee injury in late October, played in all 28 games for Coach Morrill during the 1998-99 season and averaged 4.5 points and 3.3 rebounds per game. Utah State also returns redshirt freshman Nate Harris and senior Mike Puzey who both sat out the 2001-02 season but participated in practice. Harris was the Player of the Year in the state of Utah as a prep senior averaging 23 points and 13 rebounds a game, while Puzey averaged 2.0 points and 2.1 rebounds per game during the 2000-01 season at the University of Utah.

Utah State Welcomes Five Newcomers

Stew Morrill welcomes five new players to this year's team adding a lot of athleticism and depth to one of the best programs in the Big West Conference. All five newcomers are junior college transfers and several players will be looked upon to make immediate contributions. Highlighting this group should be junior guard Mark Brown who was named the Southern California Junior College Player of the Year as a sophomore after averaging 15.0 points, 4.8 assists and 3.4 rebounds per game at Saddleback Junior College. Junior Cardell Butler will also see plenty of time after sitting out during the 2001-02 season after transferring from the College of Southern Idaho where he averaged 10.6 points and 2.7 rebounds per game. Junior Greg Patton will be another player looked upon to make an immediate impact after averaging 10.3 points, 4.2 assists and 3.0 rebounds per game at Northeastern JC. USU also welcomes juniors Ian McVey and John Neil who may both redshirt this season. McVey averaged 17.0 points, 11.5 rebounds and 2.5 blocks per game at Fergus Falls JC as a sophomore, while Neil averaged 12.0 points and 6.0 rebounds per game at Canada JC as a sophomore during the 1999-2000 season. Neil has spent the past two years on an LDS Church Mission in Venezuela.

Utah State Records 20-Wins For Third Straight Year

With its 23-8 record during the 2001-02 season, Utah State notched its third straight 20-win season, marking only the second time in school history that feat has been accomplished. USU won 28 games during the 2000 and 2001 seasons. The only other time USU won 20-plus games in three straight seasons was from 1962-64 when those teams won 22, 20, and 21 games.

Aggies Advance To Third Straight Postseason

Utah State made its third straight postseason appearance during the 2001-02 season going to the NIT (NCAA in 2000 and 2001) as well as its fourth postseason appearance in the last five years (three NCAA and one NIT), and its fifth appearance in the last eight seasons (three NCAA and two NITs). It is the second time Utah State has appeared in three straight postseason tournaments with the other time occurring from 1962-64 when that team appeared in three straight NCAA Tournaments. USU is the first team from the Big West Conference to make three straight postseason appearances since New Mexico State went to six straight postseason tournaments from 1989-94.

Utah State Wins Sixth Regular Season Title

Utah State won its sixth regular season Big West championship during the 2001-02 season with its 13-5 league mark. It is the fourth time that USU has won the regular season championship in the last six years.

USU Records Fifth-Most Wins In School History

Utah State's 23 wins during the 2001-02 season are the fifth-most in school history trailing the 2000-01 and 1999-2000 teams that won 28 games each, the 1997-98 team that won 25 games, and the 1959-60 team that won 24 games.

Aggies Fourth In The Country In Scoring Defense

Utah State finished the '01-02 season fourth in the country in scoring defense at 58.1 points allowed per game. USU was also 11th in field-goal percentage defense (39.3), 12th in rebound margin (+6.5), 25th in scoring margin (+8.9), 29th in field-goal percentage offense (47.1), and 29th in winning percentage at 74.2 percent.

USU Wins Old Oquirrh Bucket For First Time In 17 Years

Utah State won the Old Oquirrh Bucket for the first time in 17 years during the 2001-02 season, as the Aggies had the best winning percentage versus in-state opponents among the five division one schools in the state. USU went 2-1 on the season with wins over BYU and Utah. The Old Oquirrh Bucket (named after the Oquirrh Mountains to the west of Salt Lake City) is the symbol of in-state basketball supremacy in Utah. The trophy is awarded every year to the in-state college team (BYU, Southern Utah, Utah, Utah State and Weber State) which has the best won-loss record against in-state competition. The last time Utah State won the Old Oquirrh Bucket was during the 1984-85 season when the Aggies went 5-1 against in-state competition. All-time, USU has now won the award on six different occasions.

Evans Named Academic All-Big West

Chad Evans was one of six student-athletes in the Big West Conference to be named academic all-Big West during the 2001-02 season. Evans, a junior forward from Ogden, Utah, played in all 31 games for Utah State last year, starting 17. He averaged 4.4 points and 3.4 rebounds per game and played 21.4 minutes per contest.



Penigar Named To All-Tournament Team

Senior forward Desmond Penigar was named to the 2002 Big West Conference all-tournament team after leading the Aggies to a runner-up finish. Penigar scored 20 points versus Pacific and averaged 14.7 points and 4.7 rebounds per game.

Penigar Named To NABC All-District Team

Senior forward Desmond Penigar was named to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC)/Pontiac Division I All-District Team in 2002 recognizing the best men's collegiate basketball student-athletes in the country. Penigar was named to the second team in District 14.

Penigar Named Big West Conference Player Of The Week Three Times During 2001-02 Season

Desmond Penigar was selected as the Big West Conference Player of the Week three times during the 2001-02 season after leading Utah State to its first conference road sweep of the season at Long Beach State and UC Irvine. Against the 49ers, Penigar recorded his fourth double-double of the season with 15 points and 11 rebounds to go along with a career-high three steals. Against UC Irvine, Penigar just missed another double-double with 18 points and nine rebounds to go along with a career-high three blocks, two of which came in the final 1:06 of play to preserve the Aggie win. Penigar received his first player of the week selection on Nov. 26 after leading the Aggies to a road win at Utah with 22 points. He followed that performance up with a 34 point, nine rebound effort against BYU the following weekend to win the award in back-to-back weeks. Penigar is the second Aggie ever to win the award three times during a season, joining Eric Franson, and the only player in the Big West Conference to receive the award three times.

Penigar Becomes 38th Aggie Ever To Score 500 Points During A Season

Desmond Penigar became the 38th player in Utah State history to score 500 points in a single-season with his 12 points against UC Santa Barbara in the championship game of the 2002 Big West Tournament. Penigar finished the 2001-02 season with 532 points which ranks as the 30th most points scored at USU in a single-season.

Aggies Go 14-2 At Home On The Season

Utah State went 14-2 at home during the 2001-02 season marking the sixth time in school history that USU has won 14 home games during a season. The 14 home wins are the third most all-time in a single year.

Aggies Continue Winning Ways At Home In League Play

Despite having its 31-game home court winning streak snapped during the 2001-02 season, USU has still had tremendous success against the Big West at home. Over the past six years, Utah State has gone 49-2 (.961) at home against league opponents. Those two losses came against UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine by one point each and both baskets to beat the Aggies came at the buzzer.

Home Sweet Home

Utah State has had tremendous success at the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum since the building was opened for the 1970-71 season. In its first 31 years, USU has had only one losing season at home, with a 3-8 record during the 1981-82 year. All-time, USU is 351-98 (.782) at home. Over the past five-plus seasons, USU has compiled an incredible 82-5 (.943) record at home.

Recapping The EA Sports All-Stars Game

Desmond Penigar scored 25 points and grabbed 13 rebounds and Cardell Butler scored 21 points off the bench to lead Utah State to a 106-97 overtime win against EA Sports. Butler scored 17 of his points in the second half including seven in the overtime period, while Penigar's 25 points and 13 rebounds were both game highs. In all, five players scored in double figures for the Aggies, who reached the 100-point mark for the first time in the Stew Morrill era. Utah State shot 48.8 percent from the field and out-rebounded EA Sports 55-35. Former Wyoming guard Brett McFall led EA Sports with 24 points. USU built an eight-point lead at 29-21 late in the first-half before EA Sports cut the margin to two at the break after a 12-6 run. USU never trailed in the second half and led 80-68 with 5:27 left in the game. EA Sports, however, ended the second half on a 19-7 run to tie the game and force overtime with the teams tied at 87. EA Sports went ahead 88-87 early in the extra period before USU gained control as Butler scored on a three-point play to lead a quick 13-4 run. Other Aggies in double figures included Mike Puzey who had 15 points and eight rebounds and Toraino Johnson and Ronnie Ross, who each scored 11 points. All 12 Aggies that played in the game scored. Mark Brown started at point guard and had seven assists and five points, while Ross, last year's point guard moved to the shooting guard position and added six assists to go along with his 11 points.

Recapping The Global Sports Game

Desmond Penigar scored 20 points on 8-of-14 shooting to go along with six rebounds and two assists to lead Utah State to a 83-68 win over Global Sports in the Aggies final preseason game of the season. Spencer Nelson came off the bench to score 14 points, as well as notching a team-high nine rebounds in the contest. Mike Puzey was the only other Aggie to record double-digits in points with 10, all of which were scored in the first half. Utah State shot 50 percent in the game and recorded 20 assists while committing just seven turnovers. Once again, USU got a lot of production from its bench with 32 points (Utah State had 42 points from its bench in its first exhibition win over EA Sports). Along with a solid shooting performance from the field, USU was very adequate from three-point range, hitting 5-of-12 (41.7%). The Aggies also shot extremely well from the free throw line, connecting on 18-of-22 (81.8%) charity attempts. Other Aggies to make solid contributions in the game included Mark Brown who had nine points and five assists, Ronnie Ross who had six points and four assists, Toraino Johnson who had six points and three rebounds, Greg Patton who had seven points and three assists, and Cardell Butler who had six points and five rebounds. Former UTEP star George Banks led Global Sports with 18 points, while former Nevada player Daniel Watts added 11 points and seven rebounds. Global Sports did out-rebound Utah State 34-32 in the game.

Three Aggies Named All-Conference In 2002

For the third straight year, Utah State had two players earn first-team all-league honors in 2002 as Tony Brown and Desmond Penigar were named by the league's coaches, while Jeremy Vague earned honorable mention all-conference honors. The duo of Brown and Penigar joined USU's other pair of first-team selections in Shawn Daniels and Troy Rolle in 2000 and Daniels and Bernard Rock in 2001. The honor for Brown marked the fourth straight year he has received a postseason honor by the Big West Conference. In 1999 he was named to the league's all-freshman team, while earning honorable mention all-conference honors in 2000 and second-team accolades as a junior in 2001. Brown ranked in the top five in the conference in eight different statistical categories during the 2001-02 season. He led the conference in free throw percentage (85.7), three-point percentage (43.6), and assist-to-turnover ratio (2.29), while ranking second in assists (4.81) and three-pointers made per game (2.42), fifth in field goal percentage (48.9) and sixth in scoring (14.9) and fourth in steals (1.65). Penigar finished the season second in the league in scoring at 17.2 points per game, while also ranking sixth in rebounding at 6.9 and ninth in blocks with 0.68 per game. He also ranked seventh in field goal percentage (48.7) and seventh in free throw percentage (79.1). Vague was selected to the honorable mention all-conference team while averaging 8.6 points and 5.6 rebounds on the season. He led the team in field-goal percentage at 57.8 percent and ranked ninth in the conference in rebounding.

Morrill Comfortable At Home

Utah State head coach Stew Morrill is very comfortable at the Dee Glen Smith Spectrum, and his record would confirm that fact. Since becoming USU's head coach prior to the 1998-99 season, he is 57-5 (.919) at home.

Among the Best In The Country

Utah State basketball has been among the best in the country since the 1999-2000 season as USU has posted an amazing 79-20 (.798) record. USU went 28-6 during the 1999-2000 and 2000-01 seasons, and 23-8 during the 2001-02 season. That 79.8 winning percentage ranks as the seventh-best in the country over the past three years, while the 79 wins are the eighth-most in the country. The following is a look at the top-10 teams in the country based on winning percentage.

**Head Coach Stew Morrill**

Stew Morrill (Gonzaga, 1974) is entering his fifth season at the helm of the Utah State men's basketball program after posting three straight 20-win seasons and guiding the Aggies to three straight postseason appearances. In his four years at USU, he has an incredible 94-33 record, which is the best record by any coach at Utah State during that time span. Over the past three years, Morrill has coached five first-team all-league players in Shawn Daniels (twice), Troy Rolle,

Bernard Rock, Tony Brown and Desmond Penigar. In his four years at USU, he has had over an 80 percent graduation rate. He has been involved in postseason action six times in his career, including the NCAA Tournament at Utah State in 2000 and 2001, and the National Invitation Tournament in 2002. He has been named Coach of the Year three times, winning the award in 1991 at Montana, and in 2000 and 2002 at Utah State. He is only the third coach in the history of the Big West Conference to go undefeated in the league, as he led the 1999-2000 squad to a perfect 19-0 league record, joining Lou Henson and Jerry Tarkanian. Prior to coming to Utah State, Morrill had been the head coach at Colorado State University for seven seasons, recording a 121-86 record (1992-98). Prior to his stint at CSU, Morrill spent five seasons as the head coach at the University of Montana (1987-91), where he went 97-52. During his 16 years as a head coach, Morrill's teams have won at least 20 games seven times and have won at least 17 games in 13 of his 16 seasons as a head coach. He was the second winningest coach at Colorado State behind only Boyd Grant.

✓ Stew Morrill is the third-winningest coach in the history of the Big West Conference with a .740 winning percentage in all games and a .758 winning percentage in conference games. Morrill trails Lute Olsen (Long Beach State, 1974) who went 24-2 (.923) overall and 12-0 (1.000) in league play, and Jerry Tarkanian (LBSU, 1970-73 & UNLV (1983-92) who went 405-58 (.875) overall and 205-17 (.923) in league play.

✓ Stew Morrill's 312 career wins ranks third among active Big West coaches, trailing Pat Douglass of UC Irvine (451) and John Masi of UC Riverside (436).

✓ Stew Morrill is the 34th winningest active coach in the country with his 64.6 winning percentage and his 312 wins are 43rd most among active coaches.






