Rattlers Open 2003-04 Campaign Sunday at Illinois State Redbirds

The Florida A&M Rattlers, which had its' first winning season in a decade a year ago (17-12), open a year of high expectations on the road Sunday at Illinois State.

Armed with a senior backcourt, led by 2003 NCAA three-point shooting king **Terrence Woods** (139 treys; 45.6 percent from beyond the arc; 20.5 points per game), plus a trio of talented newcomers, the Rattlers have been tabbed favorites in the *Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference.*

Head coach **Mike Gillespie**, **Sr.**, a Joliet native, who was an All-America at DePaul (1974), brings home three Illinois natives in Chicago sophomore forward **Richard Russell** (Westinghouse HS/Pratt CC); Aurora junior guard **Jeremy Henderson** (Aurora Christian HS) and new assistant coach **Chrys Cornelius**, of Joliet.

Mike Gillespie

Head Men's Basketball Coach DePaul 74 • 3rd Year at FAMU

When Michael Gillespie was formally presented to the Florida A&M community in May 2001, his acceptances speech was akin to that of a grateful suitor, who had finally won the heart of his beloved.

By the time he finished, the tall, personable Midwesterner had shed his coat, snatched the microphone form the podium in storied old Gaither Gymnasium and virtually transformed into a camp meeting preacher, beginning the

first night of a revival.

For any other coach, the revival of the once-proud Florida A&M basketball would be a daunting task, but not for Gillespie, who in the miracle working style of the proverbial camp-meeting healers, has made a sterling reputation by resurrection moribund programs on every level into championship contenders.

With his impressive resume of past accomplishments in hand, his latest challenge, that of turning around a Rattlers program that has not seen a winning season since 1992, may well be his greatest miracle yet.

Gillespie had demonstrated a penchant for reviving struggling programs during his 27-year coaching career, which spans high school stints in his native Illinois to collegiate stops in Florida.

The devout Catholic began his athletic and coaching career in the same state-Illinois. As a prepster Gillespie was an All-State basketball player at Joliet Catholic High School, where he was also an all-conference basketball player.

From there, Gillespie went on to a stellar three-year playing career at Chicago's DePaul University, where under the legendary Ray Meyer, he turned in MVP performances for the Blue Demons in 1973 and 1874.

His leadership potential was evident even then, as he was tabbed team captain in 1974 and he was also honored with Outstanding College Athlete in America honors in 1974 as well.

Upon graduating from DePaul in 1974, Gillespie began his slow, but gradual rise to coaching greatness with the first of three prep mentoring assignments, at Aurora (Ill.) Central High (1974-75). There, he posted two winning seasons, capturing the regional championship in 1975.

From there, he returned to his roots - Joliet Catholic High - where during an eight year-year run (1976-83), he shattered school records with three 20-win seasons and four regional titles (1978, 1979, 1980, 1982).

Gillespie finished his coaching "apprenticeship" on the high school level at United Township High in East Moline, Ill. (1984-87), before making the leap to the next level by heading south like all snowbirds, to Florida.



He landed his first college job at St. Leo College, where he brought a struggling programs back to life during his two-stint (1998-00), posting a 15-12 mark his first year in the always tough Sunshine State Conference. It was St. Leo's first winning campaign in six years.

Then Gillespie flew north to Tallahassee, that is - where he engineered his most recent "miracle" at nearby Tallahassee Community College. He started the program from scratch in 1991 en route to fashioning a 258-56 record in 10 seasons at the helm for an .822 winning percentage.

The Eagles were ranked #1in the state of Florida among junior colleges all 10 years under Gillespie, also garnering national Top 25 ranking during that span as well.

While TCC rolled up 10 straight season of 20-plus wins, perhaps Gillespie's finest hour came in 1996-97, when the 35-2 Eagles took a number one national ranking into the national junior college tournament, reaching the Final Four.

He followed up the scintillating run with a number one national ranking in the next year (25-6) in 1997-98.

The last two years of his tenure, Gillespie put together a 54-7 record, a Panhandle Conference Title (2001) and a pair of number two national ranking (2000, 2001).

The 52- year old Gillespie, who also served as director of TCC, was comfortable at the junior college level. He had developed relationships with some of the biggest names in Division I basketball and had transformed the lives of numerous student-athletes by helping them earn scholarships to top institutions.

Yet, there was something missing.

Despite his success at TCC, he had still not achieved the goal of running his own Division One program. From Time to time, his name would surface as a candidate for job opening, but some doubted he could transfer his penchant for success from the junior college level to the Division One realm. Gillespie refused to listen to the nay sayers and continued to overseas the flouring program at TCC.

In March 2001, the FAMU job was vacated. Again, Gillespie named was tossed around by FAMU officials and alumni, his supporter at TCC, in the community and the media as well. Despite an impressive contenders for the job in the end, it became clear that Gillespie was the right man for the job.

So on May 12, 2001, officials knighted Gillespie the new men's basketball coach at Florida A&M.

In short order, he began the long, pain fill process of revival in June 2001, signing three players with Division One experience, including transfer from such noted college programs like Tennessee and West Virginia.

That process has paid dividends, as the Rattlers won nine (9) games his first season, then exceeded even the most optimistic fan by posting a 17-12 mark - the school's first winning season since 1991-92.

FAMU finished fifth in the league standings and parlayed that hand into a semifinal berth where they took on eventual champion South Carolina State, pushing the Bulldogs to the limit before bowing out.

So now the stage is set for Act Three of the Gillespie Era as the once downtrodden Rattlers are actually favorites to win the whole MEAC enchilada in 2004.

Gillespie Personal:

The highly personable Gillespie and his lovely wife of 32 years, Connie, are the proud parents of two children, son Michael and daughter Kristen, both of whom followed dad into the "family business" - coaching basketball.

Son Michael Jr. is in his second season on the Rattler coaching staff.

3 • Demarcus Wilkins 6-0 • 170 • Senior • Newnan, Ga. • Newnan HS

Wilkins has been one of the most exciting players in Rattler history. He is very quick and can find numerous ways to score. Wilkins has been a clutch performer for the Rattlers in his three year career at FAMU. He is expected to fight for the starting shooting guard position this season.

@ **2002-03**: Wilkins started in 27 of the Rattlers 29 games last season. He finished the season as the Rattlers third leading scorer averaging 9.2 points per game. Wilkins scored a season high of 20 points against Alabama A&M (12-16-02-), and poured in 16 points in the semifinals of the MEAC Tournament against South Carolina State (3-14-03).

Wilkins had two clutch performances for the Rattlers last season, both against Coppin State. In the second meeting of the season, Wilkins hit the game tying three-pointer to send the game into overtime. The Rattlers went on to win the game 73-69. In the third meeting of season in the quarterfinal round of the MEAC Tournament, Wilkins drove the length of the floor with five seconds remaining in the game to score the winning basketball to give the Rattlers a 55-53 win.

Wilkins finished second on the team in assists with 81 averaging 2.8 assists per game. Wilkins dished out 10 assists against Howard University (1-13-03) and a nine assists performance against Bethune-Cookman (12-3-02).

Wilkins finished the season tied for third on the team in steals with 39 averaging 1.4 steals per contest. He recorded four steals against Alabama State University (11-30-02), three steals performances against University of Cincinnati (11-26-02), University of Central Florida (12-7-02), South Carolina State (2-3-03) and Morgan State (3-3-03).

@2001-02: Wilkins played in 28 games for the Rattlers, while starting 26 of them. He finished the season averaging 12.6 points, 3.0 rebounds, 2.6 assists and 2.4 steals per game. He led the Rattlers in steals with 67.

Wilkins finished the season as the team's second leading scorer with 352 points and shot 79 percent from the free-throw line. He scored a career high of 30 points in an overtime win against Coppin State (2-3-02), and had a 23 points performance against Georgia Tech (11-16-01).

Wilkins led the team in scoring on eight different occasion including game high against South Carolina State (1-7-02) and Morgan State (3-4-02). He finished the season dishing out 74 assists to lead the Rattlers that season.

@2000-01: Wilkins played in 20 games for the Rattlers for the 2000-01 season. He had to sit out for the eight games due to an wrist injury suffered in preseason. Wilkins led the team in scoring averaging 13.6 points per game. Wilkins finished the season with 45 steals,

second only to Morris Scott (54) to finished second on the team in steals. He finished the season averaging 2.4 rebounds, 2.8 assists and 2.2 steals per game. Wilkins reaped 2001 MEAC All-Rookie Team honors.

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Wilkins scored a season high of 29 points against North Carolina A&T (3-5-01), and had a 24 point effort against Bethune-Cookman (3-2-01), and a garnered two 23 point games performances against Troy State (2-14-01) and Howard (1-13-01). He dished out nine assists against Howard (1-13-01).

@ High School: Wilkins was a two-time All-Region player for Newnan High School in Newnan, Ga., as a junior and senior. He finished his high school career scoring 1,500 career points. In his senior season, Wilkins averaged 20 points and seven assists per game.

@ Personal: Demarcus Antwaun Wilkins was born on February 11, 1981 in Newnan, Ga., to Joseph and Linda Latham. Wilkins has three sisters and lists his mother as his favorite non-sport figure. After graduation from FAMU, Wilkins hopes to continue his basketball career. He is currently majoring in criminal justice.

15 • Terrence Woods 6-3 • 185 • Senior • Memphis, Tenn. Treadwell HS • University of Tennessee

Woods brings a wealth of experience to the Rattler's backcourt. This First Team All-Conference performer has displayed exceptional range with his ability to shoot the long trey. Woods a team player, that get his teammates involved and raises their level of play.

@2002-03: Woods hit 139 three-pointers, the fourth-highest single season total in NCAA history... finished the season ranked first in the MEAC and the NCAA in three points field goals per game with 5.0 three points field goal per game; ranked first in the MEAC and third in NCAA in three-point field goal percentage at 45.7 percent; rank second in the MEAC and 17th in NCAA in free-throw percentage at 88.7 percent and rank third in scoring and 30th in NCAA in point per game averaging 20.5 points per game. Woods tied the NCAA record with (11-16) three- pointers in one game against North Carolina A&T (2-1-03) in a 86-61 win and broke the record against Coppin State (3-1-03) with (12-18) three-pointers in a 73-69 overtime win. Woods a went (8-15) against Morgan State (1-25-02) in a 85-65 win; went (8-10) from behind the three point arc in a 97-77 win over Delaware State (2-8-03).

Woods finished the season with five 30 plus-point game performances.... He had a 38 point performance against North Carolina A&T (2-1-03); a 36 point performance against Coppin State (3-1-03); a 34 point performance against Delaware State (2-8-03); a 32 point performance against Alabama A&M (12-16-02) and a 31 point performance against Morgan State (1-25-03).

@2001-02: Woods sat out after transferring from the University of Tennessee.

@2000-01: Woods' first 48 of 61 field goals were from behind the three-point line. He hit a three-pointer as time expired to force an overtime with South Carolina (2-27-01) to give Tennessee and 68-67 win. Woods scored 14 of his career high 21 points against Middle Tennessee State (12-15-00). He scored nine points and pulled down four rebounds and dished out three assists in 14 minutes of work in Tennessee's first round action against UNC-Charlotte (3-16-01). Woods scored 11 points in only 19 minutes of work at the SEC Tournament. He went 5-of -6 from the three-point line en route to 16 points in only 12 minutes of playing time versus Florida (2-18-01). Also, Woods converted a three point play against the gators. Woods drilled a three-pointer with 32.7 seconds remaining at West Virginia (12-2-00) to give Tennessee the lead and eventually a 79-78 win.

1999-00: Woods played in 32 games in his freshman year at the University of Tennessee. He had proven to a dependable long-range threat, who finished the season shooting 47.1 percent from the field and 40.6 percent from behind the three-point arc. Woods averaged 3.4 points and 1.0 rebound per game with 26 of his 40 field goals were from behind the three-point line. He finished the season ranked fourth on the team in three-point field goals. In the first two round of the NCAA Tournament, Woods saw seven minute of action against Louisiana Lafayette and Connecticut. He scored 11 points against Memphis and Georgia, hitting three trey in each contest. Woods was perfect 4-for-4 from the field against Georgia. He scored nine pooints in season-opener vs. Elon with three-pointers. He had a six points performance and pulled down a season high four rebounds against Mississippi. Woods scored 10 points, while posting a perfect game from the field a 4-for-4 night, including two treys, at Vanderbilt. Against Arkansas and South Carolina in the SEC Tournament, Woods pulled down three rebounds. Against Georgia, Woods scored seven points and garnered three steals.

@High School: Woods reaped first all-state honors in 1999. He was named the Player of the Year in Memphis by the Commercial Appeal. Woods averaged 27 points, 12 rebounds and two assists during his senior campaign in leading Treadwell High School to a 25-9 record. Woods led the city in scoring as a senior, while connecting on 90 percent of free-throws. In his junior season of play, Woods averaged 20 points per game to lead Treadwell High School to finish fifth in the metro Memphis scoring race. After his senior season of competition, Woods participated in the Tennessee-Georgia All-Star game. During the summer months, Woods was a member of the Alabama AAU team, where hit 11-of-13 three point shots.

@Personal: Terrence Jemar Woods was born on September 10, 1981 to Bennie and Sharon Woods in Florence, Ala.... Woods lists Michael Jordan as his favorite sports figure. He came to FAMU after leaving Tennessee because of the basketball program showed strong interest in him and he believed he contribute to the team. Woods is currently majoring in sports management with aspiration of owning a business, upon graduation from FAMU.
