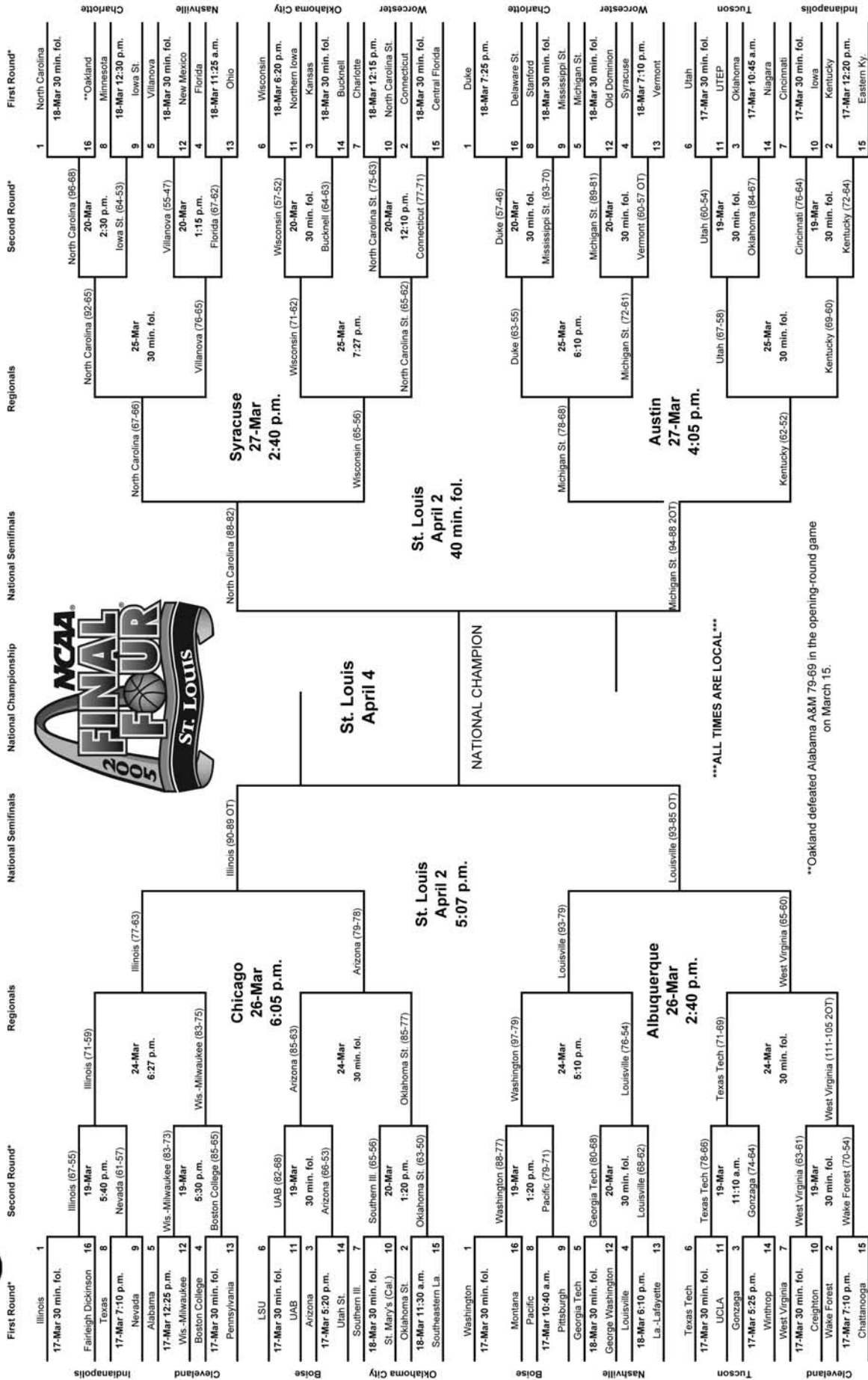

• This is Illinois' fifth appearance in the NCAA Final Four, and its first since 1989. Illinois finished third in 1949, 1951 and 1952, and were most recently beaten by Michigan in the national semifinals in 1989. Following is Illinois' all-time results in the Final Four:

• This is the seventh time in NCAA Tournament history that the Big Ten has had two teams in the Final Four. The last time was in 2000, when Michigan State and Wisconsin both reached the Final Four, with the Spartans going on to win the title. Below is the list of times that the conference has had two teams in the Final Four (teams listed in bold went on to win the national championship):

1976 - **Indiana** and Michigan
 1980 - Iowa and Purdue
 1989 - **Michigan** and Illinois

• This is Illinois' first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance in St. Louis, but the Illini are very familiar with the Gateway to the West. The Illini face Missouri in the "Braggin' Rights" game, played annually in December at the Savvis Center, and lead the Tigers 16-8 in games played at St. Louis. Illinois has also made one appearance at the Edward Jones Dome, facing St. Louis University at the then-TWA Dome on Dec. 6, 1997. The Illini lost that game by the score of 57-51.

2004-05 ILLINOIS BASKETBALL NOTES

- Illinois is a No. 1 seed for the third time in school history. Illinois was a No. 1 seed in the Midwest Region in 1989 and went on to advance to the Final Four in Seattle. Illinois last earned a No. 1 seed in 2001 in the Midwest Region, when it advanced to the Elite Eight in San Antonio.

- The Illini are 10-2 (.833) all-time as a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

- Illinois is making its 25th appearance in the NCAA Tournament, which is the second highest number of Tournament appearances among Big Ten schools trailing only Indiana's 32. This is the sixth-consecutive year Illinois has been in the Tournament, all with Top-5 seeds.

- Illinois has compiled a 36-25 (.590) record all-time in NCAA Tournament appearances. Since 1975, when the field was increased to 32 teams, Illinois has advanced to the Sweet 16 eight times (1981, 1984, 1985, 1989, 2001, 2002, 2004 and 2005), the Elite Eight four times (1984, 1989, 2001 and 2005) and the Final Four twice (1989 and 2005).

- Bruce Weber is making his fourth-straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament, which includes his last two years at Southern Illinois and his first two seasons at Illinois. His all-time NCAA Tournament record as a head coach is 8-3 (.727) after leading the Salukis to the 2002 Sweet 16, the Illini to the Sweet 16 last season, and this year's UI squad to the Final Four.

Illini Head Coach Bruce Weber

Bruce Weber has led the Fighting Illini to the top of the national charts in just his second season at the helm of the Illinois program. After leading the Fighting Illini to their first outright Big Ten title since 1952 last season, Weber has had Illinois at No. 1 in the national polls for the majority of this season. Weber is the only coach in the history of the Big Ten Conference to win outright league titles in each of his first two seasons. He has led the Illini to a school-record 36 wins in 2004-05, with the Illini also claiming the Big Ten Tournament championship in addition to this year's regular season conference title. He has also led Illinois to its first Final Four appearance since 1989.

Weber has already won the Naismith and Henry Iba Coach of the Year Awards and has also been named national coach of the year by *The Sporting News*.

Weber became just the third coach in Big Ten history to win an outright title in his first season in the league in 2003-04, leading the Illini to 10 straight victories to end the regular season and claim the title.

Weber came to Illinois following five years at Southern Illinois where he led the Salukis to Missouri Valley Conference titles each of his last two seasons.

In his five seasons at SIU, Weber took the Saluki program to the top of the MVC, winning league titles in 2002 and 2003. He posted records of 28-8 and 24-7 in his last two seasons, leading the Salukis to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances including a run to the Sweet Sixteen in 2002 with wins over Texas Tech and Georgia at the United Center in Chicago. Weber earned Missouri Valley Conference Coach-of-the-Year honors following the 2003 season.

A 1978 graduate of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Weber spent 18 years as an assistant at Purdue under Gene Keady before moving to SIU.

He has helped teams make 19 NCAA Tournament appearances in 26 seasons as a collegiate coach, including one Final Four, one Elite Eight and four Sweet Sixteen appearances. Purdue won six Big Ten titles during his stop in West Lafayette.

roster who have scored 100 or more points in NCAA postseason play, led by Brown's 136 points. Joining him in that group are Deron Williams (128 pts.), Luther Head (121 pts.) and James Augustine (100 pts.).

- Illinois' all-time leading rebounder in NCAA Tournament play is junior James Augustine, who has pulled down 78 boards in nine games (8.7 avg.).
- Deron Williams is Illinois' career assists leader in NCAA Tournament play, with 62 assists in nine games (6.9 avg.). He has twice recorded 10 assists during this year's tournament, with 10 vs. Nevada in the second round and 10 vs. Arizona in the regional final.
- Ken Norman shot .632 (36-57) from the field and .833 (15-18) from the free-throw line in NCAA Tournament competition, the best figures among any Illini who played more than three tournament games.

- Deron Williams is the 12th leading scorer in this year's tournament, having totaled 66 points. Williams, meanwhile, leads the tournament field in assists and assists average, with 34 assists (8.5 avg.).

- James Augustine is the third leading rebounder in this year's tournament, having grabbed 41 rebounds.

- Current members of the Fighting Illini squad have played a total of 86 games in the NCAA Tournament with Luther Head leading the way with a school-record 12 appearances in NCAA postseason play. Roger Powell has played in 11 games, Nick Smith has played in 10 games, and James Augustine, Dee Brown, Jack Ingram and Deron Williams have each played in nine games. In addition to his seven NCAA games with the Illini, Ingram made two appearances at Tulsa as a sophomore in 2002 before transferring to Illinois. Rounding out the Illini roster, Rich McBride has played in seven games, Warren Carter in six, Brian Randle in two, and Shaun Pruitt and Fred Nkemdi in one.

- Seventeen different Fighting Illini players have recorded double-doubles in NCAA Tournament action on 22 different occasions. James Augustine has three double-doubles in this year's tournament, recording 11 points and a career-high 15 rebounds vs. Fairleigh Dickinson in the first round, a career-high 23 points and 10 rebounds vs. Nevada in the second round, and 11 points and 10 rebounds vs. Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the regional semifinal. Deron Williams has two double-doubles in this year's tournament, with 15 points and 10 assists vs. Nevada in the second round and 22 points and 10 assists vs. Arizona in the regional final.

- Illinois fought back from its largest deficit of the season, 15 points, to defeat Arizona in the regional final. The Illini trailed 75-60 with four minutes remaining, but closed with a furious 20-5 run to tie the game at 80 and send it to overtime.
- Deron Williams scored 22 points against Arizona, his second highest point total of the season, to lead the Illini. He recorded his third double-double of the season, with a game-high 10 assists in addition to his 22 points.
- Luther Head scored 20 points and played 39 minutes against the Wildcats, despite playing with a sore right hamstring.
- Illinois set a school record with 16 three-

pointers against Arizona, breaking the previous record of 15 treys which the Illini set twice earlier this season; vs. Penn State on Jan. 12 and vs. Purdue on March 3.

Williams Named Chicago Regional MOP; Head All-Regional Pick

Junior Deron Williams was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Chicago Regional on Saturday. He scored 21 points on 8-12 shooting against Wisconsin-Milwaukee and had eight assists. Williams then scored 22 points against Arizona, 18 of which came in the second half and overtime, hitting five 3-pointers against the Wildcats and leading Illinois' improbable comeback. Williams made it a double-double against the Wildcats, dishing out 10 assists in 44 minutes of play. In the two games, Williams averaged 21.5 points on 59 percent shooting and 9.0 assists.

Luther Head was also honored, earning recognition as a Chicago All-Regional Team selection. Despite playing on a sore hamstring

throughout the weekend, Head played 33 minutes vs. Wisconsin-Milwaukee and 39 minutes vs. Arizona. He had 12 points, six assists and two steals vs. Wis.-Milwaukee and 20 points and four steals vs. Arizona.

Illini Comeback Against Arizona One For The Ages

It's a good thing there have been countless television replays of Illinois' thrilling come-from-behind win Saturday over Arizona, because no Illini player or coach after the game was able to recall the details or what exactly transpired in the greatest comeback in school history. While it wasn't the largest comeback win in team annals – that would be a 21-point deficit (42-21) against Seton Hall on Dec. 9, 2000 that turned into an 87-79 win – this surely was the most significant, with a trip to the Final Four and Illinois' winningest season in school history on the line. The Illini, which entered the Arizona game having trailed in the second half just five times in 36 games and had never trailed by double figures at

any point in the season, found themselves behind by 15 points, 75-60 with four minutes left. But what followed was an Orange and Blue blur, an amazing 20-5 run to tie the game and send it to overtime at 80-all. Below is the play-by-play recap of how the Illini fought back to tie the game:

Illinois then took over in overtime, jumping out to a 90-84 lead after a layup by Roger Powell, a 3-pointer by Williams and steal and layup by Head. Arizona. The Wildcats later cut it to one and had the game's final possession, but Williams played solid defensive on Hassan Addams, who was forced to throw up a contested 3-pointer at the buzzer that missed.

Illini Continue to Climb Chart for Most Wins in a Season; Set Big Ten Record for Winningest Season

According to NCAA records that date back to 1938, Illinois is just the fifth team in Div. I history to record at least 36 wins in a season. Among those previous four teams, only Kentucky in 1948 won the NCAA Championship.

The evening concludes with the NABC Coaches All-Stars, a collection of the nation's top college seniors, taking on the Harlem Globetrotters at 8:30 p.m.

Brown and Weber Earn Sporting News National Awards

Dee Brown has been named National Player of the Year by *The Sporting News*, while the magazine has also tabbed Bruce Weber as its National Coach of the Year, the publication announced last Tuesday.

Brown was also a first-team All-America selection, while Deron Williams was named a second-team All-American by the magazine.

Illini in the NCAA Tournament - Recapping the 1st & 2nd Rounds

- Illinois advanced to its fourth NCAA Sweet 16 in the last five years after a successful weekend in Indianapolis which featured a 67-55 win over Fairleigh Dickinson in the first round followed by a 71-59 victory over Nevada in the second round.

- Dee Brown scored 19 points on 7-10 shooting, Luther Head had 13 points, and James Augustine had a double-double with 11 points and a career-high 15 rebounds to lead the Illini over Fairleigh Dickinson.

- Augustine was one of four Illini to reach double figures, exploding for a career-high 23 points on 9-11 shooting, in the win over Nevada. He also had 10 rebounds for his fifth double-double of the season.

- Deron Williams had 15 points and 10 assists to also notch a double-double against Nevada, while Luther Head had 14 and Jack Ingram came off the bench to score a career-high 12 points on 6-7 shooting.

- Illinois' defense was suffocating during the first two rounds, allowing an average of just 57 points and 38.7 shooting by its two opponents.

- James Augustine averaged 17 points and 12.5 rebounds and shot 68.8 percent (11-16) in the two wins.

- The Illini trailed for just 15 seconds out of 80 total minutes during the first and second rounds. Illinois' lone deficit during the weekend came when it fell behind Fairleigh Dickinson 20-19 at the 7:26 mark of the first half, before taking the lead back for good at 21-20 with 7:11 left. The Illini never trailed against Nevada.

- The attendance at the RCA Dome on Saturday for Illinois' game vs. Nevada (and the Kentucky-Cincinnati game that followed) totaled 40,331, setting an NCAA Tournament attendance record for the First or Second Round.

Weber wins Henry Iba Award

Head Coach Bruce Weber has been named the winner of the 2005 Henry Iba Award, presented annually by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association to the national college basketball coach of the year. Weber becomes the first Illinois coach to receive the award since the USBWA began selecting a coach of the year in 1959.

Weber will be presented the Iba Award at a breakfast on Friday, April 1 at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis. The breakfast is open to the public with tickets priced at \$65 per person. Illini Secure Winningest Season in School History

With its 36 victories, Illinois has set a school record for wins in a season. The previous Illini record was 31 wins, set by the 1988-89 Flyin' Illini squad which advanced to the NCAA Final Four and finished the year with a record of 31-5. Brown Named USBWA First-Team All-American; Head named to Second Team Illinois had two players recognized on the 2005 U.S. Basketball Writers Association All-America Teams. Dee Brown was selected to the 5-player first team, while Luther Head was named to the 5-player second team.

Brown is joined on the first team by Utah's Andrew Bogut, Wake Forest's Chris Paul, Duke's J.J. Redick and Kansas' Wayne Simien.

Joining head on the second team are Arizona State's Ike Diogu, North Carolina's Sean May, Arizona's Salim Stoudamaire and Syracuse's Hakim Warrick.

Illini Guards All Named Second-Team All-Americans by NABC

Illinois' entire starting backcourt was voted to the All-America Second Team as selected by the National Association of Basketball Coaches, with Deron Williams, Dee Brown and Luther Head all receiving recognition. The NABC picks a 5-player first team, second team and third team, with 15 total players receiving All-America honors. Illinois was the only school to have multiple players named to the NABC All-America Teams.

Illini Ranked No. 1 in Final Associated Press Poll

For just the third year in school history – and for the 15th straight poll – Illinois is the No. 1-ranked team in the nation. The Illini's 15 consec-

utive polls at No. 1 is the longest streak by any team in eight years, since Kansas owned the top spot for the final 15 weeks of the 1996-97 season.

The Illini were unanimously voted No. 1 in the poll released on March 14, which is the final AP poll of the season. This is the first time in school history that the Illini have been ranked No. 1 in the final AP poll. Previously, Illinois' best final ranking was No. 2 in 1952. The Illini are also the first Big Ten team to be ranked No. 1 in the final AP poll since Indiana in 1993.

This has been the first season in school history that the Illini have been ranked first for more than one week. Prior to this season, the last time Illinois was ranked No. 1 was the week of Jan. 23-29, 1989. The UI first appeared No. 1 in the Associated Press poll for a week during the final week of the regular season in January, 1952. In each of the three seasons when the Illini have achieved a No. 1 ranking, they have gone on to advance to the NCAA Final Four.

Recapping the Big Ten Tournament

- Illinois entered the Big Ten Tournament as a No. 1 seed for the third time in tournament history, and went on to win the championship. This marked Illinois' second conference tournament title, along with winning the 2003 tournament. Illinois became just the second No. 1 seed to win the tournament – along with Michigan State in 1999 – and joined the Spartans as the only team to win both the outright regular season Big Ten title as well as the conference tournament in the same season. MSU first accomplished the feat in 1999.
- Now with two tournament championships, Illinois is just the second Big Ten school to become a multiple-time winner of the tournament, joining Michigan State, who claimed back-to-back tournament titles in 1999 and 2000.
- Illinois held its opponents (Northwestern, Minnesota and Wisconsin) to 32.5 percent shooting (53-163) during the Big Ten Tournament and allowed an average of just 50 points per game. The Illini also forced 46 turnovers during the three-game stretch, (15.3 avg.) and outrebounded the opposition by an average of 6.7 rebounds.
- Illinois has the most all-time Big Ten Tournament wins (16) and the best all-time Big Ten Tournament winning percentage (.727, 16-6).
- Illinois has the most Big Ten championship game appearances, having advanced to the title game five times in eight tournaments, including the last three years.
- Illinois is the only school to advance to the Big Ten Tournament semifinals every year in the 8-year history of the event.
- Illinois' entire starting lineup has now earned

Big Ten All-Tournament Team honors during his respective career. Roger Powell, Jr. was honored in 2003, and Dee Brown and Deron Williams were both honored last year. Luther Head was named to this year's All-Tournament Team, while James Augustine was named the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

Augustine Big Ten Tournament MOP; Head named to All-Tournament Team

Junior James Augustine was a consistent force in leading the Illini to the Big Ten Tournament title. For his efforts, he was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player. Augustine averaged a double-double of 12.7 points and 10.3 rebounds while shooting 73.7 percent from the field (14-19). He led the Illini in scoring against Northwestern, totaling 15 points with eight boards. He recorded a double-double in the quarterfinals vs. Minnesota with 11 points and 14 rebounds. He finished with 12 points, nine boards and three blocks in the title game vs. Wisconsin.

Luther Head earned All-Tournament Team honors after leading the Illini with 40 points (13.3 avg). He also averaged 5.7 rebounds and had 11 assists on the weekend. Head had 14 points vs. Northwestern, a team-high 14 vs. Minnesota and 12 vs. Wisconsin.

Brown Sweeps Big Ten Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year Honors

Junior Dee Brown was named Big Ten Player of the Year by both the coaches and the media on March 8, and was also honored as the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year by the league coaches. Brown is the third Illini player in the last five years to be chosen as the Big Ten Player of the Year, joining Frank Williams (2001) and Brian Cook (2003). He is only the third UI player ever to be named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, joining Bruce Douglas (1985 and 1986) and Stephen Bardo (1989).

Brown has pulled off a rare feat by sweeping both awards this year. He is just the third Big Ten player since the conference began honoring a defensive player of the year in 1984 to be named both Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year in the same season, joining Michigan's Gary Grant (1988) and Minnesota's Bobby Jackson (1997).

Three UI Guards Named First-Team All-Big Ten

Illinois had three players named to the 5-player

All-Big Ten first team (coaches and media) announced on March 8 in junior Dee Brown, senior Luther Head and junior Deron Williams. The Illini backcourt trio has joined exclusive company by earning first-team accolades. This marks the first time since 1975, and just the fifth time since World War II, that at least three players from the same team have been placed on the All-Big Ten first team. It is the third time in school history that it has happened. Paul Judson, George Bon Salle and Bill Ridley all earned first-team recognition for the Illini in 1956, while Gene Vance, Jack Smiley and Art Mathisen were the first UI trio to accomplish the feat in 1943.

This is the second straight first-team All-Big Ten selection for Williams. He becomes the first Illini player since Frank Williams in 2001 and 2002 to make the first team in consecutive seasons.

Weber Named Big Ten Coach of the Year

Bruce Weber was honored by the media for directing Illinois' outstanding season by being named the 2005 Big Ten Coach of the Year. Weber is just the second Illini coach to ever earn the honor. Since the award began in 1973, Lou Henson was the school's only other honoree, in 1993. Under the direction of Weber this season, the Illini have won a school-record 36 games, which included 29 straight wins to start the year, tying the 12th best start in NCAA Div. I history and the third best start in Big Ten history. Illinois won its second straight outright Big Ten championship this year with a 15-1 league record, tying the best record since the conference went to a 16-game schedule in 1998. Along with last year's conference championship, Weber is now the first coach in the 100-year history of Big Ten basketball to win consecutive outright titles in each of his first two seasons.

Illinois' Three Guards Named Finalists for Wooden Award

Illinois leads the nation with three players named to the official ballot for the Wooden Award All-America Team and Player of the Year. The Wooden Award Committee has selected 23 players as finalists for the award, which includes Illinois' Dee Brown, Luther Head and Deron Williams. A national panel of over 1,000 voters comprised of sports media and college basketball experts will vote for the 10-member Wooden All-America Team as well as the Wooden Award Player of the Year. The winner be announced on April 9 at Noon CT during a CBS telecast of the

Head Named Rupp Award Finalist

Illini senior Luther Head is one of 10 finalists for the Adolph Rupp Trophy, presented by the Commonwealth Athletic Club of Kentucky. Joining Head as finalists for the Rupp Player of the Year Award are Andrew Bogut (Utah), Ike Diogu (Arizona State), Joey Graham (Oklahoma State), Sean May and Rashad McCants (North Carolina), Chris Paul (Wake Forest), J.J. Redick (Duke), Wayne Simien (Kansas) and Hakim Warrick (Syracuse). The finalists have been chosen by a committee of coaches, administrators and journalists. A 5-player Rupp All-America Team will be announced at the conclusion of the regular season, and the winner of the Rupp Trophy will be announced on March 31 in St. Louis.

Weber Named Finalist for Jim Phelan Coach of the Year

Bruce Weber has been named one of 10 finalists for the Jim Phelan National Coach of the Year, which is presented by CollegeInsider.com. The voting is done by a 21-member panel made up of current and retired head coaches, athletic administrators and members of the media. In addition to Weber, other finalists are Ray Giacoletti (Utah), Bobby Lutz (Charlotte), Bruce Pearl (Wisconsin-Milwaukee), Skip Prosser (Wake Forest), Al Skinner (Boston College), Tubby Smith (Kentucky), Bob Thomason (Pacific), Ralph Willard (Holy Cross) and Roy Williams (North Carolina). The winner will be announced on April 1 in St. Louis.

Illini Trio Named Finalists for Oscar Robertson Player of the Year

Illinois leads the way with three players named to the list of 16 finalists for the Oscar Robertson Player of the Year, as voted on by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association. Starting guards Dee Brown, Deron Williams and Luther Head all appear on the USBWA ballot for the Oscar Robertson Trophy, which will be awarded on April 1 in St. Louis.

Illini Nation's Second Winningest Team over Past Five Seasons

Illinois ranks as the second-winningest team in the nation over the past five seasons in terms of total wins, and ranks third nationally over that same time span in terms of winning percentage. Illinois has reeled off 140 victories since the beginning of the 2000-01 season, which trails only Duke. Illinois' .814 winning percentage over the same time period trails just Duke and Gonzaga. Illini Final Undefeated Squad of Season

Illinois was the last NCAA Div. I team in the country to boast a perfect record at 29-0 before losing March 6 at Ohio State. Illinois now has 36 victories, which is the highest win-total in the nation this season and tied for the fourth most in NCAA history.

Weber Makes History as Illini Clinch Second Straight Outright Big Ten Championship

Following Michigan State's loss at Indiana on Feb. 27, Illinois clinched its second straight outright Big Ten title. This is the program's fourth Big Ten title in the last five years and fifth in the last eight years, and is the 17th conference championship in school history for the Illini.

This is first time in 53 years and the third time in school history that the Illini have won back-to-back outright league championships, along with 1942 & 1943 and 1951 & 1952. Illinois becomes the first Big Ten team to win back-to-back outright titles since Purdue won three straight outright titles from 1994 through 1996.

Bruce Weber has also entered the record books, becoming the first coach in the 100-year history of Big Ten basketball to win consecutive outright championships in each of his first two seasons.

Illini Winning Streaks Snapped at OSU

Illinois had two of the longest NCAA Div. I winning streaks snapped in a 65-64 loss at Ohio State on March 6. The Illini's 29-game winning streak was the longest winning streak in the nation, and Illinois' 14-game road winning streak was the longest road winning streak in the nation. Illinois won its last six road games last year and had won its first eight road games this season.

Illini in Midst of Record-Setting Season

Illinois' record of 29-0 to begin the season set a school record for the best start to a season in the 100-year history of Fighting Illini basketball. The 29 straight wins also ranked as the longest winning streak in school history, breaking the previ-

Big Ten Streakin'

Illinois won a school-record 25 straight Big Ten games – its final 10 conference games last season and the first 15 this season. Illinois' 25-game Big Ten winning streak broke the school's previous best mark of 17-straight Big Ten wins from Feb. 21, 1914 through Feb. 9, 1916. The following are the Illini's all-time best Big Ten winning streaks:

- 25 - Feb. 3, 2004 - March 3, 2005
- 17 - Feb. 21, 1914 through Feb. 9, 1916
- 15 - Jan. 20, 1951 through Feb. 2, 1952
- 14 - March 7, 1942 through Jan. 3, 1944
- 13 - Feb. 26, 1955 through Feb. 20, 1956
- 13 - Feb. 23, 1924 through Feb. 21, 1925

Illinois' 25-game conference winning streak ranked third in Big Ten history and was the longest since Indiana won a league-record 37 straight Big Ten games from Dec. 27, 1975 through Jan. 7, 1978. Ranking second on the list is Ohio State's 27-game Big Ten winning streak from March 5, 1960 through Feb. 26, 1962.

Illinois also set a school record with a streak of 13 straight Big Ten road victories – its final six conference away games last season and its first seven this season. This broke the previous school-record streak of eight straight Big Ten road wins, which happened twice. The Illini won eight straight conference road games from Feb. 21, 1914 through Feb. 9, 1916 and again from Feb. 5, 1951 through Feb. 2, 1952.

Big Ten Near-Perfection

With a 15-0 start in Big Ten play, Illinois recorded its most wins ever to start a conference season. The Illini had twice won its first 12 Big Ten games, with a pair of undefeated conference runs in 1915 and 1943.

This was the best conference start by any Big Ten team in 29 years, since Indiana went a perfect

The Illini have compiled a record of 113-24 (.825), have won three Big Ten championships and two Big Ten Tournament championships during their tenure. Powell will earn a degree in speech communications this May, while Head will complete his coursework in sports management this May and will need only a summer internship to earn his bachelor's degree.

• **Nick Smith** owns the most Big Ten titles of any player ever to suit up in an Illini basketball uniform. During his five years, the Illini have gone 140-32 (.814), have won four Big Ten championships and two Big Ten Tournament championships. A three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection, Smith has already earned a bachelor's degree in finance and will earn his master's degree in finance this May.

In addition to their career accomplishments, these five seniors have helped take the program to new heights this year, with the team in the midst of a record-setting season with its current 36-1 overall record, Big Ten regular season and tournament titles, No. 1 ranking in the national polls for 15 consecutive weeks, and advancement to the NCAA Tournament's Final Four.

Illinois' Three Guards Named First-Team All-District by NABC

Illinois had its entire starting backcourt named First-Team All-District for District 11 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) on Feb. 18. Deron Williams, Luther Head and Dee Brown were all first-team selections, joined by Wisconsin's Mike Wilkinson and Minnesota's Vincent Grier.

Williams Sets Illini Single-Season Assist Record

Deron Williams has recorded 248 assists so far this season, setting an Illini school record in the process. He broke the previous UI school record of 200 assists set by Bruce Douglas in 1985. Williams' total also ranks third in Big Ten history for assists in a season.

His average of 6.7 assists per game (13th in the NCAA as of March 21) is also on pace to break the Illinois record for assists average in a season (6.4 apg by Tony Wysinger in 1987). In just his junior campaign, Williams already ranks second all-time at Illinois with 578 career assists.

1,000-Point Club

Four members of the current Illinois roster have joined the school's 1,000-point club this season. This is just the eighth time in Big Ten history and the 48th time in NCAA history that a team has had four 1,000-point scorers:

- Deron Williams recorded his 1,000th career-point against Northwestern on March 11, becoming the 39th player in Illinois history to score 1,000 points. Williams currently ranks 36th on the Illini all-time scoring list with 1,089 points.
- Williams joined Dee Brown, Luther Head and Roger Powell, Jr. as current Illini in the 1,000-point club. Powell recorded his 1,000th career point against Indiana on Feb. 6 and is currently 29th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,149 points.
- Head recorded his 1,000th career point against Wisconsin on Jan. 25 and currently ranks 21st on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,254 points.
- Brown recorded his 1,000th career point against Cincinnati on Dec. 31 and is currently 17th on the school career scoring chart with 1,322 points.

Great Guard Play

Illinois has what many believe is the top backcourt in the country in the three-guard lineup of senior Luther Head and juniors Dee Brown and Deron Williams. They are Illinois' top three scorers as well as the top three assists and steals leaders. The trio has accounted for 54.0 percent of Illinois' scoring and 82.5 percent of its 3-pointers. They have also totaled 80.8 percent of Illinois' assists and 57.6 percent of its steals. Perhaps most impressive is that despite playing the most minutes and handling the ball for the majority of the game, the three guards boast an incredible combined assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.31. Below is a statistical look at Illinois' starting backcourt.

3-Point Attack

With the outstanding play of the Illini guards this year, it's no surprise that Illinois is enjoying one of its best seasons ever from behind the arc. The Illini lead the Big Ten and rank 18th in the NCAA (as of March 21) with 8.7 three-pointers per game. The Illini have made 10 or more threes in 14 games this season (12 vs. Delaware State, 12 vs. Oakland, 14 vs. Gonzaga, 11 vs. Wake Forest, 10 vs. Longwood, 11 at Purdue, 15 vs. Penn State, 10 vs. Minnesota, 13 at Michigan State, 12 at Penn State, 14 vs. Northwestern, 15 vs. Purdue and 16 vs. Arizona), highlighted by a school-record 16 threes in the Regional Final victory over Arizona on March 26.

Illinois' average of 8.7 three-pointers per game is on pace to shatter the school record, with the current record of 7.5 per game set during the 1995-96 season. This year's Illini team has already broken the school's single-season record for most three-pointers in a season with 320 through 37 games, breaking the previous record of 254 set in 2001-02.

The Illini have been accurate as well as prolific from behind the arc, leading the Big Ten and ranking 18th in the nation (as of March 21) with

a 3-point field goal percentage of 39.7 percent.

Luther Head leads the way with a Big Ten-leading 2.8 threes per game (39th in NCAA as of March 21) on 41 percent accuracy from 3-point range (5th in Big Ten, 32nd in NCAA as of March 21). Dee Brown is next, ranking third in the Big Ten with 2.6 threes per game. Brown ranks second in the conference with a 3-point field goal percentage of 45 percent. Deron Williams is averaging 1.7 threes per contest. Illinois' three starting guards have accounted for 82.5 percent of Illinois' 3-pointers this season (264-of-320).

Sharing the Wealth

One reason why Illinois ranks 15th in the nation in field goal percentage (as of March 21) at 48.7 percent is unselfish play. The Illini have been moving the ball well and making the extra pass to set up an open shot. Illinois has been credited with 688 assists on its 1,038 baskets, an impressive 66.3 percent assist-to-made field goals percentage. Illinois ranks third in the nation in assists (as of March 21), averaging 18.6 apg, and has recorded at least 20 assists in 19 games on the year. The Illini recorded a season-high 27 assists vs. Wake Forest on Dec. 1 and matched that total with 27 assists at Penn State on Feb. 16.

The Illini broke the school record for assists in a season vs. Nevada on March 19, now owning a total of 688 assists on the year. This breaks the previous school mark of 639 assists set during the 1988-89 season.

Illini in Control

Illinois has trailed in the scoring column for just 125:18 out of 1,490 minutes of play this year, meaning Illinois has either held the lead or been tied in 91.6 percent of the minutes played to date in the 2004-05 season.

The Illini have also not trailed during the second half in 31 of 37 games this year. Games at Purdue (Jan. 8), at Wisconsin (Jan. 25), at Michigan (Feb. 8), vs. Wisconsin (Feb. 12), the single loss at Ohio State (March 6) and vs. Arizona (March 26) in the Regional Final, have been the only six games this season when Illinois has been behind in the second half of play. Illinois has trailed by double figures just once this season, against Arizona on Saturday, falling behind by as many as 15 points (75-60) before coming from behind for the victory. Its largest previous deficit – nine points – came at Purdue on Jan. 8.

The Illini have held the lead the entire way in 15 games this year (Oakland, vs. Gonzaga, Wake Forest, vs. Oregon, Valparaiso, vs. Missouri, Longwood, vs. Northwestern State, vs. Cincinnati, Minnesota, Indiana, at Penn State,

Quick Shots

- For the third year in school history – and the 15th straight week – the Illini are ranked No. 1 in the nation. Prior to this season, Illinois last stood atop the national polls the week of January 23-29, 1989. Illinois' first tenure at No. 1 came the final week of January, 1952. Illinois' 15 straight weeks at No. 1 is the longest streak by any team in eight years, since Kansas owned the top spot for the final 15 weeks of the 1996-97 season.

- This is the first time in school history that Illinois has spent multiple weeks ranked No. 1 in the polls. In 1952 and 1989, the Illini spent just one week at the No. 1 spot.

- Illinois' 21-game winning streak at the Assembly Hall is the fourth-longest current homecourt streak in the nation. The Illini wrapped up its third undefeated season at the Assembly Hall in the last five years with a 15-0 record this year. Illinois also went undefeated at home in 2000-01 (12-0) and 2002-03 (14-0). Illinois has the best homecourt record in the nation over the past six years at 78-3 (.963).

- Illinois has defeated all nine ranked opponents that it has played this season – No. 24 Gonzaga (Nov. 27), No. 1 Wake Forest (Dec. 1), No. 22 Cincinnati (Dec. 31), No. 23 Iowa (Jan. 20), No. 18 Wisconsin (Jan. 25), No. 12 Michigan State (Feb. 1), No. 20 Wisconsin (Feb. 12), No. 23 Wisconsin (March 13) and No. 9 Arizona (March 26).

- The Illini are averaging 8.7 three-pointers per game this season, which leads the Big Ten and ranks 18th in the NCAA (as of March 21).

Illinois set a school record for 3-pointers in a game with 15 vs. Penn State on Jan. 12 and equaled that record with 15 threes vs. Purdue on March 3. The Illini then broke that school record with 16 three-pointers in the Regional Final victory over Arizona.

- Illinois has won 29 of 36 games by double figures, and is outscoring its opponents by an average of 16.5 points per game on the year. Illinois leads the Big Ten and ranks third in the nation (as of March 21) in scoring margin.

- The Illini are shooting 48.7 percent (1038-2132) from the field and 39.7 percent (320-807) from 3-point range. Illinois ranks second in the Big Ten in field goal pct. (15th in NCAA, as of March 21) and leads the Big Ten in 3-pt. field goal pct. (18th in NCAA, as of March 21).

- In the first half of games this season, Illinois is averaging 40.6 points (1,502 pts.) on 49.6 percent shooting (564-1137), and enjoys an average halftime lead of 11.9 points (439 pts.).

- All five Illini starters are averaging in double-figures this season.

- Illinois has led the Big Ten in scoring each of the last four seasons. The Illini currently rank second in the Big Ten and 22nd in the nation (as of March 21) in scoring, averaging 77.3 points per game.

- Illinois has been credited with assists on 66.3 percent of its baskets this season (688 assists on 1038 field goals). The Illini lead the Big Ten and rank third in the nation in assists (as of March 21), averaging 18.6 assists per game. The Illini also lead the Big Ten with an assist/turnover ratio of 1.67 on the season.

- The Illini snapped Wisconsin's 38-game home winning streak on Jan. 25 with a 75-65 victory at the Kohl Center, ending the longest homecourt winning streak in the nation.

2004-05 ILLINOIS BASKETBALL NOTES

Illini have won their *first* game after earning the No. 1 ranking. In 1989, No. 1 Illinois lost at Minnesota and in 1952, the No. 1 Illini lost at DePaul. The Illini are now 32-3 all-time when ranked No. 1, with wins over Indiana in 1989 and at Purdue in 1952, in addition to 30 victories this season while sitting atop the polls.

- Illinois defeated a No.1-ranked team for the second time in school history and the first since 1979 on Dec. 1 when the Illini cruised past then-No. 1 Wake Forest 91-73.
- In its win over Gonzaga, Illinois set a number of Wooden Tradition team records, including points (89), assists (24), steals (13), three-pointers (14), as well as individual records, including assists (Luther Head, 9), steals (Luther Head-tied, 4), and 3-pointers (Deron Williams-tied, 5).
- In the season opener on Nov. 19, Illinois and Delaware State combined to set the Illinois all-time and Assembly Hall records for combined field goal percentage. The teams joined to shoot 60.8 percent (59-97), with the Illini making 35-of-55 attempts and the Hornets connecting on 24-of-42 shots.

Unselfish Point Guard Williams Directs Illini Attack

Junior Deron Williams was named the Chicago Regional Most Outstanding Player after leading the Illini to victories over Wisconsin-Milwaukee and Arizona, averaging 16.5 points and 8.5 assists in the four games. Williams, an NABC Second-Team All-American, Third-Team *Associated Press* All-American and repeat First-Team All-Big Ten selection, is the first Big Ten player ever to lead the league in assists in each of his first three seasons, after joining Michigan State's Magic Johnson (1978-79) and Illinois' Bruce Douglas (1983-84) as the only players to lead the league in their first two seasons. He is the second player to lead the league for three consecutive years along with MSU's Mateen Cleaves (1998-2000).

Williams, the Preseason Big Ten Player of the Year, earned Preseason All-America honors from *Playboy Magazine* and was a preseason candidate for the Wooden, Naismith and Rupp Awards. He has since been named a finalist for the Bob Cousy College Point Guard of the Year award, Oscar

Robertson (USBWA) Player of the Year, and Wooden Award.

Williams is third on the team in scoring this season, averaging 12.6 points (19th in Big Ten). He leads the Big Ten and ranks 13th in the nation (as of March 21) in assists, averaging 6.7 apg. Williams dished out a career-high 12 assists vs. Penn State on Jan. 12 and has recorded double figures in assists five times this season. He boasts an assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.38 to lead the team and rank third in the Big Ten. Williams is also fourth on the team in rebounding with 3.6 boards per game.

Williams had one of his best games of the season in Illinois' win over Missouri on Dec. 22, scoring 19 points - 15 of which came in the second half - with five assists. He then had a season-high 23 points with four 3-pointers vs. Longwood (Dec. 27).

Williams was named to the All-Tournament Team at the Las Vegas Holiday Classic after scoring 14 points with a game-high six assists vs. Northwestern State and a game-high 18 points with six rebounds and four assists vs. Cincinnati.

He played 39 minutes in the Big Ten opener vs. Ohio State, finishing with 14 points and a game-high eight assists.

Williams notched the fourth double-double of his career on Jan. 12 vs. Penn State, scoring 11 points in addition to his career-high 12 assists. He also tied his career high in steals with four against the Nittany Lions.

Williams was a key factor in the win at Wisconsin on Jan. 25, scoring 13 points with six rebounds and a game-high six assists.

The junior guard may have had his best shooting day of the season with 18 points on 7-10 shooting, including 4-5 from 3-point range, in the win over Minnesota on Jan. 29.

Williams repeated his 4-5 shooting from 3-point range in the following game en route to 14 points at Michigan State.

He had 15 points against Wisconsin on Feb. 12 and was instrumental in the win at Iowa on Feb. 19, scoring 18 points with five assists while playing the entire game.

In the final home game vs. Purdue on March 3, Williams hit 7-of-9 shots, including four 3-

pointers, to finish with 21 points while adding six assists and five rebounds.

Williams recorded just the third double-double by an Illinois player in NCAA Tournament history that included points and assists, with his 15-point, 10-assist effort vs. Nevada in the second round on March 19.

He scored 21 points against Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the regional semifinals on March 24 and then had another double-double with 22 points and 10 assists in the final vs. Arizona on Saturday.

Williams is headed towards numerous assists records this season. With 248 assists, he has set an Illinois single-season assists record, breaking the previous record of 200 assists by Bruce Douglas in 1985. Williams' average of 6.7 assists per game is also on pace to break the Illinois record for assists average in a season (6.4 apg by Tony Wysinger in 1987).

In just his junior campaign, Williams already ranks second all-time at Illinois with 578 career assists.

Williams recorded his 1,000th career point against Northwestern on March 11 and currently ranks 36th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,089 points.

The Head of the Class

Guard Luther Head entered the season as one of the most underrated players in the nation, and has been playing at an All-America-level in this his senior year. A Second-Team All-American by the AP, USBWA and NABC and a First-Team All-Big Ten selection, Head was also recently named a finalist for the Rupp, Wooden and Oscar Robertson Awards. He earned All-Chicago Regional Team honors after averaging 14.8 points in four games of the NCAA Tournament.

Head leads the Illini in scoring at 15.7 points per game (6th in Big Ten), is second on the team with 63 steals (5th in Big Ten), while also contributing 3.8 assists per game (5th in Big Ten). He is shooting 46.7 percent from the field and 41 percent from 3-point land (5th in Big Ten, 32nd in NCAA as of March 21) with a Big Ten-leading 105 treys. Head broke the Illinois school record for 3-pointers in a season vs. Nevada on March

19, breaking the previous school mark of 96 set by Cory Bradford in 2000.

Head also leads the Illini and ranks seventh in the Big Ten in free throw shooting at 78.4 percent (76-97).

Head opened the season by scoring in double figures in five straight games with 15 points vs. Delaware State, 13 vs. Florida A&M, a game-high 22 points vs. Oakland, 20 points vs. Gonzaga and 16 points vs. Wake Forest.

After his streak ended against Arkansas, Head responded with eight straight games in double figures: a game-high 17 points vs. Chicago State; 13 at Georgetown; game-high 23 vs. Oregon; 11 against Valparaiso; 20 vs. Missouri; 20 vs. Longwood; game-high 18 vs. Northwestern State; and 11 vs. Cincinnati.

That streak came to an end vs. Ohio State on Jan. 5, but Head then put together a career-best streak of 11 consecutive games in double figures. He has been Illinois' leading scorer in eight of the last 20 games, with 15 points at Purdue; 19 vs. Penn State; season-high 26 at Northwestern; 25 vs. Iowa; 18 at Wisconsin; 22 at Michigan State, and, a season-high tying 26 vs. Wisconsin, and 14 vs. Minnesota.

He was named Big Ten Co-Player of the Week on Jan. 17 after averaging 22.5 points, 4.5 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 2.5 steals against Penn State and Northwestern.

Head has an assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.18 on the year, which ranks fifth in the Big Ten. In consecutive games vs. Gonzaga and Wake Forest, he combined for 14 assists with only two turnovers. He tied his career-high in assists with nine dimes apiece in back-to-back games vs. Oakland and Gonzaga. Head also had nine assists with no turnovers vs. Valparaiso.

Head recorded his 1,000th career point against Wisconsin on Jan. 25 and currently ranks 21st on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,254 points.

Dee Lighting it Up

Perhaps the most recognizable face in college basketball, junior guard Dee Brown has been gracing covers of newspapers and magazines everywhere while continuing to rake in the awards. The reigning Big Ten Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year, Brown has been named the National Player of the Year by The Sporting News, a First-Team All-American by the USBWA and a Second-Team All-American by the AP and NABC. He is also a finalist for the Wooden and Oscar Robertson Awards.

Brown was one of the hottest players in the nation during the stretch run that closed out the regular season, en route to capturing Big Ten player of the Year honors. Over the final nine

games prior to the Big Ten Tournament, Brown averaged 17.7 points and scored in double figures in all nine contests, led by a career-high 27 points vs. Purdue on March 3. Brown shot 58.2 percent from the field (53-91) and an incredible 57.6 percent from 3-point range (34-59) over those nine games. He tied a school record with eight threes vs. Purdue, hitting 8-of-10 from behind the arc. This came on the heels of his 6-for-8 performance from 3-point range against Northwestern on Feb. 23.

Brown led Illinois during its NCAA first-round win over Fairleigh Dickinson, scoring a team-high 19 points on 7-10 shooting. He then had 21 points on the strength of 5-8 shooting from 3-point land, in the regional semifinal win over Wisconsin-Milwaukee. In the final vs. Arizona, Brown totaled 15 points, seven assists, five rebounds and three steals.

Brown has had a hot shooting hand throughout the season, shooting 50.7 percent (159-313) from the field (15th in Big Ten). That percentage is even more impressive when considering that over 62 percent of his shots have come from 3-point range. And Brown has been dependable from downtown as well, shooting 45 percent (95-211) from behind the arc, which ranks second in the Big Ten.

Brown is second on the Illini in scoring at 13.5 points per game (16th in Big Ten). He recorded his 1,000th career point against Cincinnati on Dec. 31, and is currently 17th on the school career scoring chart with 1,322 points.

While Brown's scoring has increased, he has made his presence felt in all areas, averaging 4.5 assists, 1.8 steals and 2.6 rebounds on the season. He tied his season high in steals with four against Michigan on Feb. 8, which included a sensational series where he had three steals on consecutive possessions, all of which he converted into layups. He had 11 assists at Penn State on Feb. 16 to record his first double-double of the season, as he also scored 19 points.

Like his backcourt teammates, Brown has also been taking care of the ball and making good decisions. His 4.5 assists average ranks third in the Big Ten. He also has an assist-to-turnover ratio of 2.31 on the season to rank fourth in the Big Ten.

In consecutive games vs. Gonzaga and Wake Forest, Brown combined for 15 assists without a turnover. In a three-game stretch vs. Chicago State, Georgetown and Oregon, he combined for 20 assists with just four turnovers (game-high nine assists with one turnover vs. Chicago State; game-high six assists with two turnovers at Georgetown; five assists with one turnover vs. Oregon). Against Longwood on Dec. 27, Brown had a career-high 13 assists, tying the third high-

est single-game assist total in UI history.

Brown ranks sixth on the Illinois career assists list with 472 assists.

The Rev Rises to the Occasion

Senior forward Roger Powell, Jr. is fourth on the team in scoring, averaging 11.8 points, and is second on the team with 5.5 rebounds, while shooting 54.7 percent from the field (162-296, ninth in Big Ten). Standing 6-foot-6 and playing the power forward position, Powell is often undersized against his opponent. But he causes a match-up problem for the defense with his quickness and ability to step out and face the basket and either drive or hit the outside shot. Powell currently ranks fifth on the UI career field goal percentage chart at 57.2 percent (443-774).

Powell had perhaps his best game of the season Dec. 1 vs. Wake Forest, scoring 19 points on 8-of-10 shooting, which included a pair of 3-pointers. He followed that performance with another 19 points and a game-high 11 rebounds in a victory over Arkansas. Powell was named Big Ten Player of the Week on Dec. 6 for his performance in those two games.

In a victory at Georgetown on Dec. 9, Powell led the Illini with 19 points on 8-of-11 shooting.

In one of his best games during Big Ten play, Powell scored a season-high 21 points on 8-12 field goal shooting, including 2-3 from three-point range, in the win over Minnesota on Jan. 29.

He shot a perfect 10-for-10 from the field at Penn State on Feb. 16, tying his season high with 21 points.

Powell took center stage in the Big Ten Tournament Championship, recording the sixth double-double of his career with 15 points and a career-high 12 rebounds.

Powell recorded his 1,000th career point against Indiana on Feb. 6 and is currently tied for 29th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,149 points.

Powell is scheduled to graduate with his bachelor's degree in speech communications in May. He is a licensed minister in the Pentecostal church.

Augie Leads on the Interior

Junior James Augustine, a Third-Team All-Big Ten selection, recently was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Big Ten Tournament after leading the Illini to the championship. Augustine averaged a double-double of 12.7 points and 10.3 rebounds while shooting 73.7 percent from the field (14-19). He led the Illini in scoring against Northwestern, totaling 15 points with eight boards. He recorded a double-double vs. Minnesota with 11 points and a game-high 14

rebounds. He finished with 12 points, nine boards and three blocks in the title game vs. Wisconsin.

Augustine continued his torrid pace during the first weekend of the NCAA Tournament. In the first round win over Fairleigh Dickinson, he had a double-double with 11 points and a career-high 15 rebounds. He then notched a career-high 23 points and 10 rebounds vs. Nevada in the second round. Augustine posted his sixth double-double of the season and the 16th of his career with 11 points and 10 rebounds in the regional semifinal victory over Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

In seven postseason games combined (Big Ten and NCAA Tournaments), Augustine is averaging 12.4 points and 10.3 rebounds on 70.7 percent shooting (29-41).

Augustine has been consistent in the paint throughout the season, averaging 10.4 points while shooting 63.3 percent from the field (140-221), and averaging a team-high 7.6 rebounds. He leads the Big Ten in field goal percentage, and ranks fifth in the league in rebounding. Augustine also leads the Illini with 46 blocked shots (6th in Big Ten).

Augustine was named Big Ten Player of the Week on Jan. 10 after notching a double-double vs. Ohio State (Jan. 5) with 21 points and 10 boards, and adding eight points and a game-high nine boards at Purdue (Jan. 8). On the week, Augustine averaged 14.5 points and 9.5 rebounds while shooting 71.4 percent from the field (10-14).

Augustine earned his second Big Ten Player of the Week award on Jan. 31 after averaging 14.5 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.5 blocks, while shooting 83.3 percent from the field in a pair of victories over Wisconsin (Jan. 25) and Minnesota (Jan. 29). He posted 14 points on 5-6 shooting, a game-high eight rebounds and two blocks in a 75-65 victory over Wisconsin, which helped end the Badgers' 38-game home winning streak. With Illinois up by just one with three minutes remaining, Augustine had back-to-back dunks to give the Illini a five-point advantage and seal the win. He followed with another strong performance, tallying 15 points on 5-of-6 shooting against Minnesota, while pulling down a team-high seven rebounds and adding a game-high three blocks.

Augustine extended his streak of scoring in double figures to six games, after scoring 11 at Michigan State, a game-high 16 vs. Indiana, and 10 at Michigan. His streak came to an end in the win over Wisconsin on Feb. 12 (four points), but he responded with 10 points at Penn State on Feb. 16 followed by 13 at Iowa on Feb. 19.

That's a Three ... Rich McBride

Sophomore Rich McBride has been valuable player on the perimeter for the Illini. He is the first guard off the bench and is averaging 14.9 minutes per game. Known for his smooth stroke from 3-point land, McBride is fourth on the team with 27 treys.

Ingram Gives Illini Big Lift off the Bench

Senior Jack Ingram is Illinois' first big man off the bench and has given the Illini a spark in a number of games. Playing 14.5 minutes per game, Ingram is averaging 4.2 points and 2.6 rebounds. He has a good outside shot, shooting 47 percent from the field and has tallied seven 3-pointers.

Ingram scored a career-high 12 points in Illinois' NCAA second-round win over Nevada on March 19, hitting 6-7 from the field. He also scored eight points in six games, including five times in Big Ten play. His best performance during the regular season came at Wisconsin on Jan. 25 when he scored eight points, including back-to-back 3-pointers during a second half run in which Illinois fought back from an eight-point deficit to take the lead for good.

Illinois-Wisconsin Game Receives High TV Rating

The Illinois-Wisconsin game on Jan. 25, which was televised by ESPN, achieved a 2.78 rating. That translates to roughly 2.5 million households, making it ESPN's most watched college basketball game of the 2004-05 season, as well as the seventh most watched regular-season college basketball game in ESPN history.

Taking Down No. 1

Illinois' victory over No. 1 Wake Forest on Dec. 1 marked the second time in school history that the Illini have defeated an opponent ranked atop the *Associated Press* poll. The last time came on Jan. 11, 1979, when Illinois defeated Michigan State 57-55. Illinois is now 2-19 all-time against No. 1-ranked opponents.

Illini Join 1,500 Club

Illinois' win over Penn State on Jan. 12 marked the 1,500th victory all-time at Illinois. The Fighting Illini became the 15th program in NCAA history to record 1,500 victories, and the program now owns an all-time record of 1,519-804 (.654). With 1,519 all-time victories, the Illini rank 14th in NCAA history in terms of total wins. And with a .654 all-time winning percentage, Illinois ranks as the 11th winningest program in NCAA history by percentage. The following is a list of the all-time winningest NCAA Div. Brown Earns Second Big Ten Player of the Week Honor - Feb. 21

Dee Brown was named Big Ten Player of the Week on Feb. 21 after leading Illinois to two road victories at Penn State and at Iowa. Brown averaged 18.5 points on combined 64 percent shooting, while adding 7.0 assists, 3.0 rebounds and 2.0 steals per game.

He posted the second double-double of his career in the win over Penn State, scoring 19 points, including five 3-pointers, while dishing out a game-high 11 assists. Brown also had four rebounds and two steals, while committing only one turnover against the Nittany Lions. He followed with another clutch performance at Iowa, shooting 7-of-11 from the floor (.636) for the second consecutive game to finish with 18 points, while adding three assists and two steals.

This marked the second time this season that Brown was named Player of the Week by the conference office. He was first honored on November 22. It was also the fourth Big Ten weekly honor of his career.

He also averaged 4.5 rebounds, three assists and 2.5 steals per game. Head scored a game-high 19 points in the win over Penn State, tallying five three-pointers, while also adding a game-high seven rebounds and three assists. He then posted a season-high 26 points against Northwestern, just three off his career best. Head added three assists and a game-high three steals against NU.

Augustine Named Big Ten POTW - Jan. 10
James Augustine was named Big Ten Player of the Week on Jan. 10 after leading the Illini to victories over Ohio State and Purdue, while nearly averaging a double-double on the week. He scored a season-high 21 points against Ohio State in the Big Ten opener. He shot 8-of-10 from the field, while also grabbing 10 rebounds to notch a double-double. Augustine then scored eight points and had a game-high nine rebounds, while adding three assists and two blocked shots in a road win at Purdue. On the week, he averaged 14.5 points and 9.5 rebounds per game on a combined 71.4 shooting percentage (10-of-13).

Powell Named Big Ten POTW - Dec. 6
Roger Powell, Jr. was named Big Ten Player of the Week on Dec. 6 following his performance in a pair of Illini victories. Powell scored a game-high 19 points in the win over then-No. 1 Wake Forest. He connected on 8-of-10 shots, including a pair of 3-pointers, while grabbing seven boards. Powell then registered a double-double in the win over Arkansas, again leading the Illini with 19 points along with a game-high 11 rebounds. On the week, Powell averaged 19 points and 9.0 rebounds while shooting 67 percent from the field (14-21) in garnering the first Big Ten Player of the Week accolade of his career.

Brown Named Big Ten POTW - Nov. 22
Junior guard Dee Brown earned the third Big Ten Player of the Week honor of his career Nov. 22 after leading the Illini to victories over Delaware State and Florida A&M. Brown totaled 37 points on the weekend, hitting 13-of-16 shots from the field, including 8-of-11 from three-point range.

Illinois Begins Season Near the Top

Illinois began the 2004-05 season ranked No. 5 in both the Preseason ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll and Associated Press Poll, its highest preseason ranking since starting the 2001-02 season ranked No. 2 in the coaches' poll and No. 3 in the AP poll.

Illinois has moved atop both polls with its 36-1 record. This is the 15th straight week that Illinois has been ranked No. 1.

Hot Ticket to Watch the Illini at the Hall

Illinois sold out of season tickets for the 2004-05 campaign, making it one of the hottest tickets in program history.

New Faces on the Roster

• **Arnold Transfers From Illinois State:** Marcus Arnold, a 6-8 forward/center from Chicago, transferred to Illinois from Illinois State in the summer of 2004 and will sit out the 2004-05 season per NCAA transfer rules. He will begin the 2005-06 season with junior eligibility.

• **Freshman Duo:** The 2004 recruiting class of 6-foot-4-inch guard Calvin Brock of Chicago Simeon High School and 6-8 forward Shaun Pruitt of Aurora (Ill.) West High School are now in their freshman season for the Illini. Brock was the Chicago Player-of-the-Year in 2004 while Pruitt was runner-up for Mr. Basketball in the state of Illinois last season. Brock has indicated that he intends to sit out the season as a redshirt to preserve a season of eligibility.

Weber Wins Big Ten Title in First Season

With the win over Ohio State on March 7, the 2004 Illini claimed sole possession of the Big Ten title. With that victory, Bruce Weber became just the third Big Ten coach to win an outright league title in his first season along with Wisconsin's Guy Lowman in 1918 and Minnesota's Bill Musselman in 1972.

Weber is the 11th coach in Big Ten history to win at least a share of the conference title in his first season. He is the third Illini rookie coach to win the league, following Doug Mills in 1937 and Bill Self in 2001.

The Graduate

Nick Smith earned a bachelor's degree in finance in December of 2003, graduating from Illinois' College of Business in three-and-a-half years. Smith is now working on his master's degree in finance and should graduate with that degree in May, 2005.

Orange Krush Honors Cardinal

The Orange Krush student support group and cheering section announced last year that it will

fund an endowment in the name of former men's basketball trainer Rod Cardinal in the amount of \$300,000 to fund future student athletic trainers for the UI sports medicine program. The Krush has already endowed the \$250,000 Matthew Heldman Memorial Scholarship, named after former Illini point guard Matt Heldman who was tragically killed in a car accident in 1999.

A Pro Look

Illinois players are getting a look at several pro venues this season. Illinois played at the Conseco Fieldhouse, home of the Indiana Pacers, on Nov. 27 against Gonzaga in The Wooden Tradition; at the MCI Center in Washington D.C., home of the Washington Wizards, on Dec. 9 against Georgetown; at the United Center, home of the Chicago Bulls, on Dec. 11 against Oregon and at the Big Ten Tournament on March 11-13; and at Savvis Center, home of the NHL's St. Louis Blues, on Dec. 22 against Missouri in the annual Braggins' Rights game. The Final Four at the Edward Jones Dome is host to the NFL's St. Louis Rams.

Illini Sign Three

Illinois signed three prep standouts to national letters of intent during the fall signing period in Jamar Smith, a 6-3 shooting guard from Peoria, Ill./Richwoods H.S.; Chester Frazier, a 6-2 point guard from Baltimore, Md./Notre Dame Prep (Fitchburg, Mass.); and Charles Jackson, a 6-7 power forward from Buena Vista, Ga./Tri-County H.S.

Cook and Williams in the NBA

Frank Williams became Illinois' first, first-round NBA draft pick since 1990 when the New York Knicks chose him as the 26th pick of the 2002 NBA Draft. He is currently with the Chicago Bulls.

In 2003, Brian Cook was chosen as the 24th pick in the first round by the Los Angeles Lakers, becoming the third Illini chosen by the NBA in the 2002 and 2003 drafts (along with Robert Archibald). Cook is in his second season with the Lakers.
