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Unemployment Rate Falls in Most Areas Compared to Last Year Payrolls up in Champaign and Rockford; Chicago Adds 60,700 Jobs

CHICAGO – June local unemployment rates fell in eight of 12 metro areas, according to preliminary data released today by the Illinois Department of Employment Security (IDES). Not seasonally adjusted data compares June 2013 to June 2012. Largest decreases: Metro East (-0.8 point to 8.2 percent), Lake County (-0.5 to 8.2 percent), Rockford (-0.5 to 11 percent), and Champaign-Urbana (-0.4 to 8.7 percent). Largest increases: Decatur (+1.6 points to 12.5 percent), Danville (+1.1 to 11.1 percent), Peoria (+0.9 to 8.8 percent), and Chicago-Joliet-Naperville Metropolitan Division (+0.7 to 10.3 percent).

Jobs increased in five metros and declined in seven. Largest increases: Champaign-Urbana (+1.8 percent, +1,800), Chicago-Joliet-Naperville (+1.6 percent, +60,700), and Rockford (+0.7 percent, +1,100). Industry sectors increasing in the most metros: Educational and Health Services (nine of 12), Financial Activities (eight of 12), and Leisure and Hospitality (seven of 12).

"Consumer confidence must grow resilient to uncertain global and national news before monthly economic growth will consistently occur in all corners of our state," IDES Director Jay Rowell said. "However, we are encouraged by the continued job growth in our larger regions."

Not seasonally adjusted data compares the current month to the same month of the previous year. The June 2013 not seasonally adjusted Illinois rate was 9.8 percent and 12.2 percent at its peak in this economic cycle in January 2010. Nationally, the unemployment rate was 7.8 percent in June and 10.6 percent in January 2010 at its peak. The unemployment rate identifies those who are out of work and looking for work and is not tied to collecting unemployment insurance benefits. Historically, the state unemployment rate is higher than the national rate. 779**13

Historically, the Illinois unemployment rate is higher than the national rate. Only six times since January 2000 has the state rate been lower than the national rate. The data is seasonally adjusted and includes times of both economic expansion and contraction. Generally, this trend holds for the 10 largest industrial states in the country, which includes Illinois.

Central Illinois Highlights

Bloomington-Normal MSA:

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped to 7.5 percent in June 2013 from 7.6 percent in June 2012. The last time the June rate was equal to or lower was in 2011 when it was also 7.5 percent. This was the fourth consecutive month the rate was equal to or below the same month last year.

Non-farm payroll employment decreased -1,300 from one year ago. Jobs were added in Leisure-Hospitality (+400) and Financial Activities (+300). Declines occurred in Government (-1,200) and Professional-Business Services (-1,000).

<u>Peoria MSA</u>:

Temporary layoffs in manufacturing helped push the not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate to 8.8 percent in June 2013 from 7.9 percent in June 2012.

Non-farm payroll employment decreased -3,600 from the previous June. The largest job gains occurred in Educational-Health Services (+1,500) and Wholesale Trade (+200). Manufacturing was down -2,300 largely due to temporary layoffs. Professional-Business Services (-1,300) also was lower than a year ago.

Ottawa-Streator Area:

The not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 10.3 percent in June 2013 from 10.7 percent in June 2012. The last time the June rate was equal to or lower was in 2008 when it was 7.5 percent. This was the third month in a row the rate was equal to or below the same month last year.

The non-farm payroll job total was unchanged from last year. Among the sectors, jobs were added in Other Services (+175), Transportation-Warehousing-Utilities (+175), Professional-Business Services (+100) and Construction (+100). Retail Trade (-300) had the largest drop.

Pontiac Area:

The June 2013 not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 8.6 percent was unchanged from the previous June.

Non-farm payroll employment decreased -200 with a gain in Transportation-Warehousing-Utilities (+50) and declines in Manufacturing (-100) and Government (-100)
