A FIRE TALE

Friday evening, June 21, 2013 a violent thunderstorm came through Lincoln, Illinois igniting a lightning strike on the roof of the Oasis Senior Center. The fire that developed smoldered until the entire roof was engulfed. As the brave firemen from neighboring communities (15 departments) fought the fire, it became obvious that The Oasis was in serious trouble. When dawn broke the roof



was gone, water and smoke damage engulfed the entire structure, windows were blown out and there was standing water in the basement. Dominic Dalpoas, Executive Director, and Wally Reifsteck, President of the Board, ventured into the building to attempt to retrieve the computers and important documents. The computers were retrieved but were completely destroyed. Fortunately, the back-up box was salvaged and the rising from the ashes began.

The following days were filled with insurance adjusters, structural engineers, and restoration services. The most pressing need was to find a temporary home out of which we could continue our programs. Community Action Partnership of Central Illinois offered an office to The Oasis on Monday, June 24, 2013. With the office space we were able to purchase a laptop, install the back up information and get back to business as usual.

The Executive Committee began a search for a temporary home. Many sites were offered and the generosity of many was very evident. The sites were toured and it was decided the St. John United Church of Christ offered us the most usable and handicapped accessible site.

St. John United Church of Christ, 204 7th Street , Lincoln, graciously opened their hearts and doors to provide The Oasis with a temporary home.

The Oasis Senior Center resumed limited services and programs on, Tuesday, July 16, 2013.

Benefit Access Programs, S.H.I.P. (Medicare Part D), Legal Aid, VA Administration, and Foot Care.

Setting up our offices at St. John's was made much easier and affordable by donations from Rick Hamm, Lincoln Land Communications and the State Farm Corporation's excess office furniture warehouse.

Obtaining office space and setting up for business became a fond memory as we forged ahead with the process of securing the burn site and proceeding with clean-up. The process has been arduous and certainly not as fast as we would have wished.


Days once again were filled with structural engineers, restoration men in big white suits, architects, insurance adjusters, impatient press, and most of all concerned and generous citizens of Logan County.

As the Oasis waits for the full range of options concerning our future, the largest fund raiser of the year looms on the horizon. Flea Market income constitutes a significant budget item. The businesses in downtown Lincoln have been very generous in extending offers of operating space for the many facets of the Flea Market operation. McQuellons, Lincoln May Enterprises have volunteered space for us to be able to have a successful Flea Market. We are always happy to have any resident volunteer to help us with this endeavor.

What do we have going at the Oasis? Our building at 501 Pulaski is still standing! It has been completely cleaned out of contents-some has gone to be restored from the fire damage and the rest has been destroyed. The building is filled with mold as well as having asbestos that will have to now be removed. There is no roof and upper walls have had to be reinforced before a new one can be put on. It seems like structural engineers keep supplying us with additional problems if the building is to be restored since we will have to meet present day code.

The Oasis Board is faced with a number of decisions over the next few months. Each member of the Oasis Board has been asked for their input. They have been asked to raise questions-offer suggestions— and free to express opinions. Anything tht will help us to plan the future of The Oasis Senior Center for another 50 years is seen as important!

While the Oasis Board will be making the final decisions, they have established what is being called the “Fire Board” made up of the executive committee and the chairpersons of the other committees to act in their behalf on day-to-day decisions when such are required.

We would like to share the information we have at our first Potluck since the fire, which is scheduled for September 12th at 11:30a.m. in the Fellowship Hall at St. John United Church of Christ, our temporary offices, at 7th & Maple Streets (parking at the back of 8th street).
