There were 32 crashes the Lincoln Police Department responded to for May 2018.






Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)

UCR Report for May 2018








Lincoln Police responded to 1169 incidents for the month of May and 95 case reports were written for the month.



Criminal Investigations

Monthly Cases Report Summary for May 2018

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on <u>14</u> active criminal investigations in the month of May. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available to for release.

- (7) Investigations were narcotics related. These cases involved the manufacture/delivery of a controlled substance and the manufacture of methamphetamine.
- (2) Investigations involved sexual offenses. These crimes involved both adults and children with offenses of criminal sexual assault and criminal sexual abuse.
- (3) Investigations involved crimes against persons. These investigations child abuse and neglect and domestic violence.
- (1) Investigation was a property related crime.
- Two officers of the Criminal Investigations Division continued to participate in a multijurisdictional drug task force, conducting joint investigations with other local, state, and federal agencies.

DARE/Community Policing

May 4th: Lincoln DARE hosted its annual Pizza Party and Dance with a DJ at the Lincoln Rec Center for all of the 6th graders in Lincoln and Logan County schools. The kids enjoyed pizza from Stuffed Aria. They played basketball, volley ball and sang karaoke. The kids had a great time and the party was a success!

May 11th: Earlier in the year, I presented both 5th grade classes at Central School with a challenge to follow all of the school rules and be good citizens. They succeeded!! I took pizza to both classes for lunch as a reward.

May 25th: Lincoln DARE donated \$200 to West Lincoln Broadwell School to sponsor shirts for the end of the year party (Field Day).

May 28th: Officer Kitner found some kids playing outside and stopped and gave them DARE toys.

Lincoln K9

Officer Sullivan and K9 Ace had 9 deployments for the month of May. Lincoln Police Department requested the K9 Unit 5 times, the Logan County Sheriff's Department requested the LPD K9 Unit 3 times, and the Illinois State Police requested the LPD K9 1 time. The K9 indicated 7 out of the 9 deployments. Out of the 7 indications, there were 5 items seized being drugs and/or drug paraphernalia. Total amount of drugs seized was 1.1 grams. The drugs indicated were Marijuana, Methamphetamine and K2 spice.

School Resource

Officer Butterfield responded to 49 incidents at LCHS for the month of May. The most common offenses were Assault/Threat, General Disciplinary Offenses with Parental Contacts, Drug Violations, Social/Emotional Issues and Threats to School/Staff. Officer Butterfield went over the new standard response protocol with the National Weather Service, Integrity Data, the Christian Child Care and Head Start. Officer Butterfield was interview on WMAY Radio about the SRP program.
