## Report Summary

April resulted in a drop in thefts which is opposite from March. Lincoln Police responded to 1065 incidents for the month and 96 case reports were written for the month. Officers responded to 26 vehicle crashes.

Of the 52 arrests for the month, officers arrested several for driving under the influence, driving while suspended/revoked, domestic battery, disorderly conduct and warrant arrests. Detectives continued investigations on 19 cases including participating in CIEG task force operations. Patrol officers wrote 116 citations and 120 warnings for the month.

Lincoln Police K9 had 15 deployments that comprised of 12 vehicles. There were 9 indications out of those deployments with 7 items being seized, all being drugs and/or drug paraphernalia. The K-9 unit made 4 arrests.

DARE continued to donate to multiple youth organizations and local schools to benefit the children of this community.

Officer Butterfield responded to an array of incidents during the month of April. The most common offenses were Harassment/Bully, class misconduct, general disciplinary offenses with parental contacts, and theft.

U.S. Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration held the 17<sup>th</sup> National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on April 27, 2019. The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day provides a safe, convenient and responsible way to dispose of unused opioids and other prescription medications, while also educating the general public about the potential for misuse of medications. The community dropped off 23 pounds of medications that day. We have a Drug Drop Box, in the front of the Police Department, that anyone can drop off expired or un-used prescription drugs at any time.

There were 26 crashes the Lincoln Police Department responded to for the month of April.

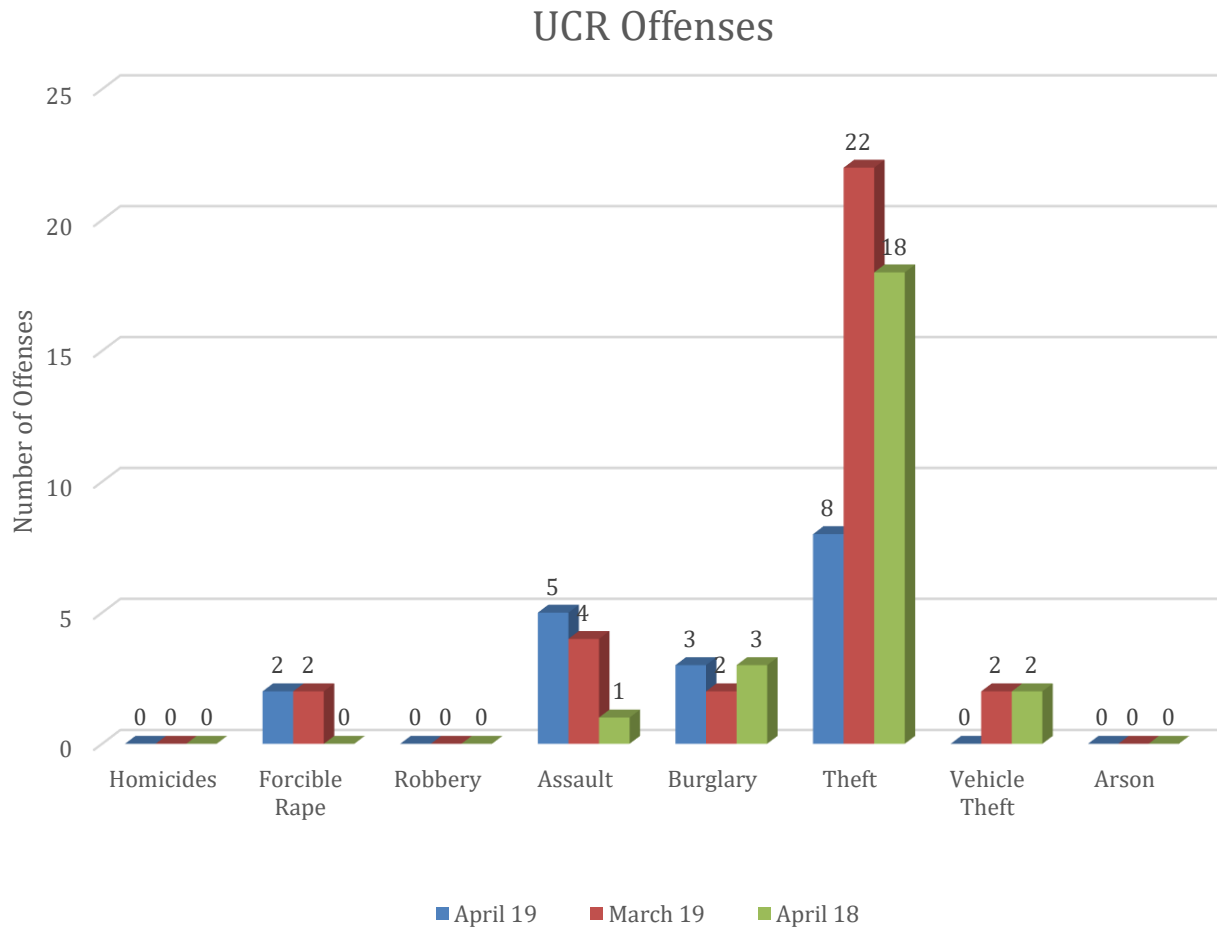

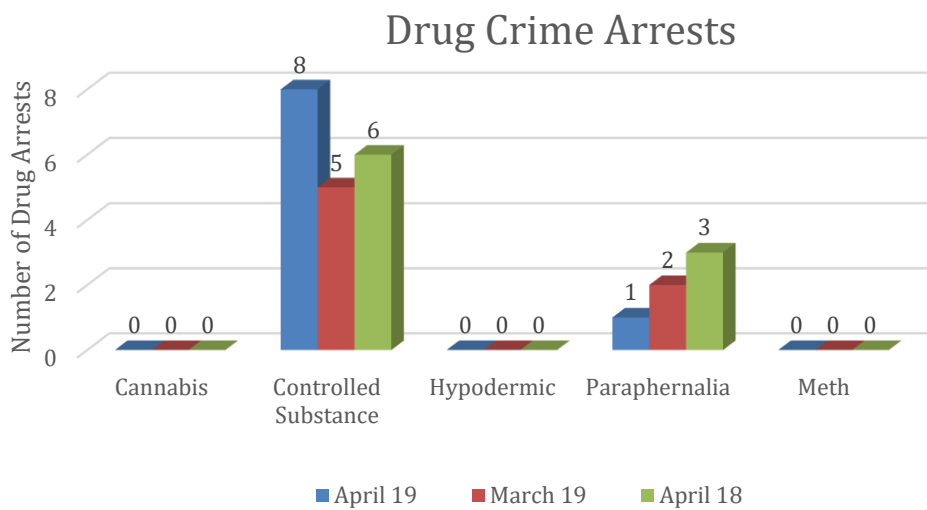
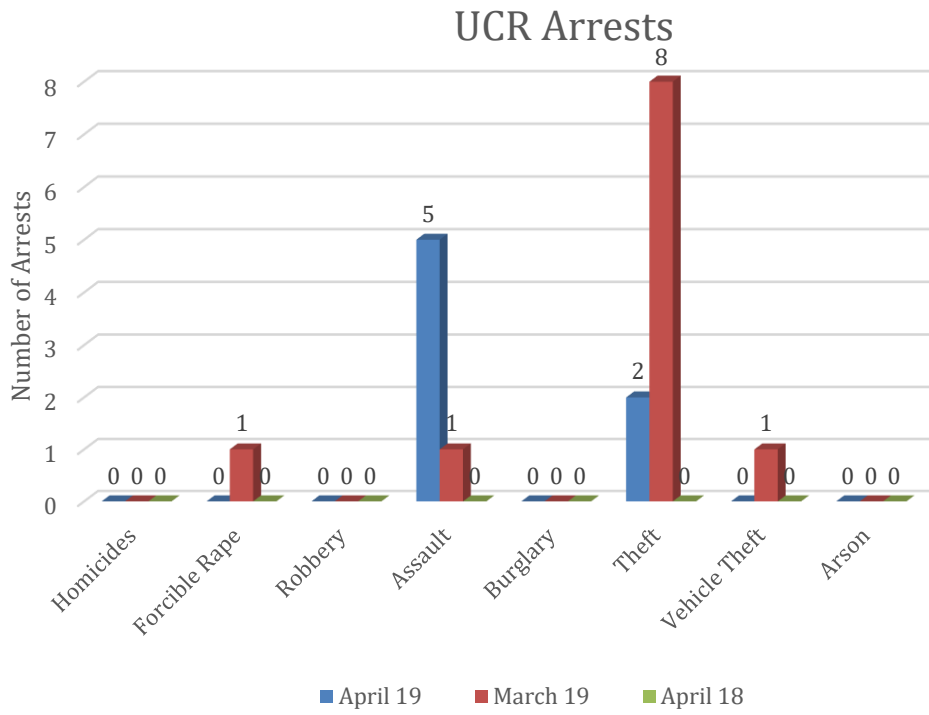
# MONTHLY STATISTICS

### UCR Report for April 2019





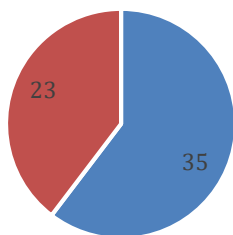

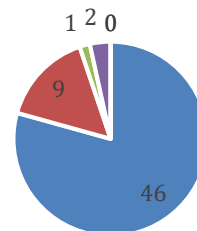

## DIVISION REPORTS

---

### Criminal Investigations

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on 19 active criminal investigations in the month of April. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available for release.

- (8) Investigations were narcotics related. These cases involved the manufacture/delivery of controlled substances such as heroin and crack cocaine. Cases also involved the delivery of cannabis and the manufacture/delivery and trafficking of methamphetamine.
- (5) Investigations involved sexual offenses. These crimes involved both adult and child victims with offenses of criminal sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual assault and criminal sexual abuse.
- (4) Investigations involved crimes against persons. These investigations involved domestic battery, and aggravated battery and child abuse.
- (2) Investigations were property related. These cases were burglary and forgery.
- Two officers of the Criminal Investigations Division continued to participate in a multi-jurisdictional drug task force, conducting joint investigations with other local, state, and federal agencies.
- (10) Search warrants were executed in furtherance of these investigations.
- Officers attended 56 hours of continuing education in the fields of Drug Interdiction, Child Abuse, and Law Updates.

### DARE/Community Policing

April 1<sup>st</sup>: Northwest, Washington Monroe, LJHS, Carrol Catholic and Central School were all given DARE T-Shirts. Lincoln DARE joins forces with the Odd Fellows to make sure each 6<sup>th</sup> grade student at these schools gets a DARE shirt.

April 3<sup>rd</sup>: Lincoln DARE donated to the Youth Trap and Skeet team. This high school co-op team is based out of Mt. Pulaski but has many kids from Lincoln in the program. Kids from Chester East, West Lincoln, and the Lincoln High School are a part of this growing program.

April 10<sup>th</sup>: Lincoln DARE joined Lincoln Junior High School and Carroll Catholic 6<sup>th</sup> graders at a Peoria Chiefs Baseball Game. This yearly event has become something these 6<sup>th</sup> grade students look forward to and enjoy.

## Lincoln K9

Officer Sullivan and K9 Ace continue to be an extraordinary benefit for the entire Lincoln Community. The K9 unit has had 15 deployments for April. The Lincoln Police Department is always using the benefits of our K-9 unit but Officer Sullivan and K9 Ace are being requested by other agencies also. The Logan County Sheriff Department and the Illinois State Police have requested the use of our K9 unit for their benefit also. On those deployments, there were 15 search areas with 12 being vehicles. There were 9 indications out of the deployments with 7 items being seized, all were drug or drug paraphernalia related. The drugs indicated on were Cannabis, Methamphetamine and Crack Cocaine. These searches resulted in 4 arrests being made.

## School Resource

Officer Butterfield responded to an array of incidents during the month of April. The most common offenses were Harassment/Bully, class misconduct, general disciplinary offenses with parental contacts, and theft. Officer Butterfield worked with the Library on their SRP procedures. Officer Butterfield worked with Illinois State Police, Lincoln Police Department and the LCHS staff in conducting a K-9 search of the LCHS campus.
