Report Summary

Social distancing and wearing a mask are critical practices that are essential to help prevent COVID-19 from spreading. The best way to practice social distancing is to avoid public places and to maintain a distance of at least six feet between you and others. In addition, practice frequent handwashing and cleaning of commonly-touched surfaces. If you are sick or have symptoms such as cough, fever and shortness of breath, call your medical provider. Lincoln Police responded to 697 incidents for the month and 104 case reports were written for the month. Officers responded to 25 vehicle crashes. Patrol officers wrote 49 citations and 22 warnings for the month.

Of the 38 arrests for the month, officers arrested several for warrants, driving under the influence of alcohol, retail theft and domestic battery. Detectives continued investigations on 20 cases including participating in CIEG task force operations.

The K9 unit is very beneficial to the Lincoln Police Department and the community. They had 2 deployments for the month of January.

DARE was able to help children with clothing and supply needs this past month.

The goals of well-founded SRO programs include providing safe learning environments in our community's schools, providing valuable resources to school staff members, fostering positive relationships with youth, developing strategies to resolve problems affecting youth and protecting all students, so that they can reach their fullest potentials. The three main roles of school resource officers are: educator (i.e. guest lecturer), informal counselor/mentor, and law enforcement officer.

There were 25 crashes the Lincoln Police Department responded to for the month of January.





MONTHLY STATISTICS

UCR Report for January 2021









DIVISION REPORTS

Criminal Investigations

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on 20 active criminal investigations in the month of January. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available to for release.

- (5) Investigations involved sexual offenses.
- (4) Investigations involved crimes against persons.
- (9) Investigations were property related.
- (2) Investigations involved the death of an individual.
- Investigators executed 4 search warrant.
- The criminal investigation division saw an increase in property related crimes in the month of January.
- Two officers of the Criminal Investigations Division continued to participate in a multi-jurisdictional drug task force, conducting joint investigations with other local, state, and federal agencies.

DARE/Community Policing

DARE was able to help buy shoes and clothing for multiple children in the month of January. Walmart has given a donation to DARE in January. DARE and the Lincoln Fraternal Order of Police, which includes all the officers on the Lincoln Police Department, have been working with the teachers in the Lincoln School Districts and the Lincoln High School, obtaining names of children that are in need of clothing and/or shoes. The Lincoln Police Department thought buying children, of our community, clothing and shoes was the best way to use the donated money. With the pandemic and cold temperatures, we need to make sure that our young population are receiving necessities that will help them achieve greater things.

Lincoln K9

Officer Sullivan and K9 Ace had 2 deployments for the month of January. The deployments resulted in indications of cannabis and drug paraphernalia.

School Resource for LCHS and District #27

Our School Resource Officers are always putting forth the positive attitudes that the kids are needing in these uncertain times. Always remember that the SRO's are there for your students if they need that ear to listen to them or just have questions they need answered.
