

Lincoln Police Department Monthly Report

January 2022

Report Summary

The City of Lincoln would like to remind everyone that the use of masks is very important in stopping the spread of the COVID-19 virus and keeping you and your loved ones safe. Anyone entering any business or organizations should wear masks while indoors or within 6 feet of others.

Lincoln Police responded to 910 incidents for the month and 92 case reports were written for the month. Officers responded to 19 vehicle crashes. Patrol officers wrote 57 traffic citations and 54 warnings for the month along with 3 City Ordinance Citations.

Of the 48 arrests for the month, officers arrested several for driving with suspended/revoked drivers license, illegal consumption/possession of alcohol by a minor, warrants and no valid drivers license. Detectives continued investigations on 25 cases including participating in CIEG task force operations.

DARE was able to help sponsor the Lincoln Railers with advertising thru WLCN. DARE was also able to obtain some help from a club that provided their assistance in helping make out the Annual DARE fundraiser envelopes.

There were 19 crashes the Lincoln Police Department responded to for the month of January.




Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)







Criminal Investigations

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on <u>25</u> active criminal investigations in the month of January. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available for release.

- (10) Investigations were property related.
- (1) Investigations were narcotics related.
- With the resignation of a Detective, only one officer of the Criminal Investigations Division continued to participate in a multi-jurisdictional drug task force, conducting joint investigations with other local, state, and federal agencies.

School Resource for LCHS and District #27
