



FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Friends,

There are a plethora of hymns of reaching out to God, Christ, the Spirit and asking them to "Take My Hand", "Walk with Me", "Tell me I am His Own", etc. The reason for this is form of hymn is the same as the need we have when we pray and then, crickets. Sometimes, it feels like God has abandoned us. Sometimes it feels like no one is really there, listening to us. Jesus felt it when he cried out on the cross, "My God, My God, Why have You forsaken me?" He was actually quoting the Psalms which are filled with laments about wondering where God is in the midst of pain, suffering and longing. I really don't know of anyone who hasn't experienced this from time to time. It's awful and feels so very awkward when attending church, hearing the pastor claims of God's loving presence and yet feeling as if God is so very far away. Sadly, some guit church at this point. Mystics, Saints, Pastors, all have felt this absence of God's presence.

So then, how do we pray? Well, I have two suggestions when you are in this difficult time. And both suggestions aren't easy! The first is: Wait. It's not God, it's usually us. And there's probably something in your life that is happening where you have grown away from God. So, wait. Don't beat yourself up for this feeling, but just wait. Don't put your spiritual self in reverse, just idle for a while. Trust that your warmth toward God will return. I know that waiting is hard but it's the best thing to do when we don't know what to do. And the second suggestion is trust. Just as when we don't see a loved one for a long time but we trust they are still our friend and we are still theirs, we can trust in our God, too. We may not feel or experience God in the moment, but we can trust that God is there.

During this time, then, pray from your heart, even if it's anger towards God. God has heard it before and God will hear it again. Tell God why your angry

and then wait and trust. Act in your life with faith, so that you still are worshipping, still serving, still faithful to our God. Even the most famous Thomas Merton wrote this prayer: "My Lord God, I have no idea where I'm going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end nor do I really know myself. And the fact that I think I am following Your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please You does in fact please You. And I hope that I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this, You will lead me by the right road though I may know nothing about it. Therefore, I will trust You always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear for You are ever with me and You will never leave me to my peril alone."

ST. JOHN UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST UNAPPROVED CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

Monday, January 17, 2022 | 7:00 p.m.

Present: Warren Goetsch, Carolyn Pech,

Jack Leich, Edna Mara, Bill Gosda, Tricia Pineda, Jan Hahn, Kent Paulus, Troy Meinershagen, Darlene Begolka (Office Manager) and Pastor Laurie Hill

President Goetsch called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. on Monday, January 17, 2022.

CONSENT AGENDA APPROVAL

President Goetsch inquired if there were any items up for removal or discussion as it related to the Consent Agenda items. No issues or concerns were raised. It was moved and seconded to approve the agenda and Jack Leich seconded. All voting aye, the motion passed.

PASTORS REPORT

Pastor Laurie indicated she has been getting ready for Lent as this year it starts in March. She also indicated we had received an invite to participate on Wednesday services at alternative church sites. After discussing it was decided we would wait until summer and revisit the subject given the current pandemic.

Pastor Laurie also indicated that Jerry and Mary Berglin requested to be members of St. John United Church of Christ. So she is seeking Council permission to allow them to join. It was moved and seconded to grant their request to become members. All voting aye, the motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS

Security System – President Goetsch indicated he had talked with Gary Atteberry and there had been some recent developments with Johnson Controls. It was discovered that there was a superseding agreement that only requires our church to provide a 30-day notice in order to severe our relationship. However, Johnson

Controls is stating the church still owes them \$600 plus dollars for prior equipment upgrades. Gary had also reported to Warren that he is having a difficult time connecting with Tech Electronics. He indicated the status at this point is that Tech Electronics is tasked with getting all needed equipment and giving Gary a timeline for installation and taking over the administration of monitoring the equipment.

Nominating Committee – Edna Mara indicated that Sandy Meinershagen will be the third person to join Council. She also indicated that Bailee Pineda was asked to be the youth delegate and declined due to a busy schedule. She stated there is no youth delegate at this time.

President Goetsch reiterated the Annual Congregational Meeting date of January 30, 2022 and indicated there are a few possible changes to the budget from Stewardship. Kent Paulus noted under Operations that for insurance in 2022 the proposed \$20,000 dollars would not be enough and would need to be increased by \$2,000 dollars for a total of \$22,000. The increase was in property and workers compensation coverage. He also noted there was a few other minor adjustments such as new 2022 pledges:

Current: \$77,431 Sister Church: \$1,952 OCWM: \$10,135 Contingency: \$6,204 Good Samaritan: \$1,772

It was moved and seconded then to make adjustments to the annual budget for presentation at the annual congregational meeting for final approval. All voting aye, the motion carried.

President Goetsch indicated due to COVID related illnesses in the church, the annual report at best would be done around mid-week prior to the congregational meeting on January 30, 2022. Discussion was had on the best way to notify members and was determined that on Sunday, Pastor Laurie would make an announcement that

printed copies would be available in the church office mid-week prior to January 30, 2022. She would also follow up with an email the following Monday after the announcement for those who may have missed the notice.

During the congregational meeting Jack Leich indicated that Outreach would like to reward a congregational member for their outstanding service. President Goetsch indicated he would talk to Jack regarding the matter after Council.

Evangelical and Reformed Historical Society -

Pastor Laurie indicated that this entity archives historical documents from churches and inquired if we would like to send them some of our history so it could be archived. The archiving is funded solely by donations. Pastor Laurie indicated she believed around \$100.00 a year would be a sufficient donation to be a member. She indicated that they also send out 2 newsletters annually. After discussion with Council, it was determined Pastor Laurie would inform Nancy Gehlbach, church historian, and get her input. Pastor Laurie would also reach out to Tom Norwalk. The biggest issue that would need to be looked into is how E&R would be able to keep our information safe.

NEW BUSINESS

Protocol – President Goetsch indicated with the increase in COVID in Illinois we need to discuss if there needs to be any changes in protocol. Much discussion and many Council members voiced their opinions and ideas. However, in conclusion it was moved and seconded to continue with current protocol mandating mask wearing and no singing for the current time. Any questions or concerns between Council meetings would continue to be addressed by the Elders and Pastor Laurie. All voting aye, motion carried.

Marcella Lenhardt's piano – Marcella's son and daughter inquired with the church if we would be interested in Marcella's piano. It was purchased in 1975 and is Maple and in excellent condition. Discussion was had about the piano in fellowship hall not holding a tune, so President Goetsch

recommended Laura Lee be asked for her input on which might be better for the church. In the meantime, Darlene will look into the origin of the fellowship hall piano to see if it was donated from a member.

Other

- Pastor Laurie apologized for not passing out oranges at Christmas Eve service. She indicated she will bring them to Sunday's service.
- Jack Leich stated we would be celebrating the Boy Scouts on Monday, January 31, 2022 and buying them dinner at Culver's for all of their assistance at Christmas time in decorating.
- Jack Leich also indicated there would be a card at a future service to sign for Pastor Charlotte Nold who is going to be celebrating her 80th birthday and is still preaching at our sister church – St. John United Church of Christ-Chicago.

CORRESPONDENCE and EMAILS-President Goetsch indicated a thank you card had been received from Pastor Laurie and he then read the card thanking Council for their support.

The meeting was closed with President Goetsch thanking Council for the past three years and wished them the best of luck on future issues. He also thanked off boarding members Edna Mara and Troy Meinershagen.

ADJOURNMENT AND BENEDICTION

With no further business to discuss a motion was made, seconded and passed to adjourn the meeting. Meeting concluded at 8:35 p.m.

PRAYER PARTNERS/GROUPS

2022 is the year of prayer and some have expressed interest in becoming a prayer partner or being involved in a prayer group. There are differences and similarities with each of these.

Prayer Partners: Being a Prayer partner means having someone (just one) with whom you pray together on a regular basis. Prayer partners can happen in all different ways. When two people agree to be prayer partners, they decide to meet in person or on the phone. They decide if they will pray aloud or quietly or both. They choose the frequency they will meet or talk together. (Usually once/week). In all cases, prayer partners agree to trust one another, which means absolutely observing confidentiality in all matters, and being faithful to the time and place they decide to meet. Good prayer partners withhold judgements and are very good listeners to one another. They sometimes choose an end to their being prayer partners, such as a year and then they re-evaluate their relationship. But I have a prayer partner that I've had for many years. And sometimes they choose to read a devotional when they are together (on the phone or in person). Usually there is a sign up list and the people self-choose their prayer partner but other times, they ask the pastor to assign them.


Prayer Groups: Being in a prayer group is selfexplanatory, in that it is a small group of people who agree to meet in person to pray together. Prayer groups usually form for a particular reason that can be broad or narrow, long term or short term. Prayer groups can meet weekly, bimonthly, or monthly. Prayer groups usually are not bigger than 6 people. Sometimes they begin with a particular devotional. Sometimes they have a list, such as the prayer list from church they review. Then they add their own concerns and joys. Usually then, someone prays aloud or they go around the room and each one prays. If someone prays, usually this leadership is shared so each time, it's someone else. Sometimes there are written prayers and sometimes, it's spoken.


Normally they close with a common benediction they all know. With a group, there is an agreement of confidentiality, but in my experience, it's harder to maintain. Just like with a prayer partner, there needs to be a high degree of trust and faithfulness to the group.

ST. JOHN 160th ANNIVERSARY

By: Tonita Reifsteck Recap #5 Niebuhr family (1898 - 1913)



In a former recap the ministry of St. John was noted in the building of a hospital for the Lincoln area who were not able to be cared for in the St. Clara's Catholic Hospital. Plans were started by the foresight of then pastor Hermann Schmidt, who had come to St. John in 1877 and whose wife, Adelheid had taken training in the Deaconess order established in the Evangelical

Church in Germany at Kaiserswerth on the Rhine in 1836, Pastor Schmidt in 1894 led the efforts to have trained deaconesses from St. Louis in the congregation. With Mrs. Schmidt's prior leadership, a hospital association was formed in 1899 and the pledge of a father with a seriously ill child the medical needs of the people and the building of the hospital was begun. Pastor Schmidt left St. John in 1897 and Rev. F. W. Schnathorst continued the guest. In 1897-98 many contracted typhoid fever, including Mrs. Schmidt. On April 23, 1899, the Deaconess movement organized a Deaconess Hospital Board. The constitution was adopted on May 14, 1899, and a Board of trustees elected. It was at this time Deaconess Sister Mathilda Feldman and later Sister Eda Wiehe (from Germany) were instrumental in caring for the ill either in the house provided or in their own homes. Meanwhile the campaign to fund a build for a new hospital continued. While ideas for building were gathered the property on the corner of Seventh and Walnut was purchased for a sum of twenty-five hundred dollars for the new hospital. The cornerstone was laid Sunday, November 4, 1900 and it remained on various locations of that site until the new ALMH was built on Stahlhut drive in 2011. At that time the cornerstone was moved to the back entrance of St. John where it stands today.

In summer of 1902 Rev, Schnathorst resigned as pastor and hospital administrator. In early fall Rev. H Gustav Niebuhr was called as pastor and hospital administrator. Several Deaconesses were added to the nursing services of St. John membership and training began for others to join the order. The first was Rosa Gerhold of Tower Hill and Louise Mernitz of Minonk – those names would become familiar leaders of the E & R churches throughout the region for many years (and yet today) Being highly regarded both in the wider church and the community, Pastor Niebuhr taught in the school, confirmation was taught in English and German. Later he was relieved of teaching in the school as he was also administrator of the new Deaconess Hospital. In 1903 a parsonage was built on 5th and Union. The Niebuhr family for a time lived in the upper level of the hospital while the parsonage on 5th Street was being built (has been told Reinhold would sit on the windowsill with his feet dangling on the outside!). In 1904 St. John joined the Evangelical Synod of No. Illinois, always forward thinking, adult home study added to Sunday School, and the sanctuary, Sunday School area and school rooms remodeled/updated. In 1908 the steeple that had been destroyed in a storm 7 years earlier, was rebuilt. In 1912 a Boy Scout troop was organized- with son Walter scoutmaster. The parochial school closed in 1916. Pastor Niebuhr confirmed all 4 children at St. John's altar - Hulda. Walter, Reinhold and H. Richard. Taken suddenly ill in 1913 pastor Niebuhr died in the parsonage. Reinhold, a senior at Eden Seminary became the interim pastor from April through September. The Niebuhr influence remains a strong foundation in St. John's history and ministry.

The children: Hulda (1889-1959) was a renowned author and leader in the church and in the field of education. She began her college education at Lincoln College. She eventually became head of Religious Education at McCormick Theological Seminary. Students referred to her as "Teacher as Artist" as she incorporated faith learning with art and drama. Her book "The One Story" was used as a confirmation resource for many years at St. John. Son Walter is the lesser known of the five Niebuhr

children (one died in infancy) Walter was a financial businessman and journalist. Son Reinhold, who in 1913, was St. John interim pastor when his father died suddenly, is known worldwide for the Serenity Prayer (1930) which shows his feelings and expectations of relationship from one person to another. In conflicts was often on opposite sides of the populace, especially in Detroit when he was pastor there dealing with the auto industry's treatment of their workers! Known to be too conservative for the liberals and too liberal for the conservatives, his theology recognized the reality of gray area of thinking not just the black and white. Reinhold put religion into two categories - prophetic religion and priestly religion. Although a library of the Niebuhr books are in a section of our church library, many find their contents too 'deep' to comprehend. In 1964 he was awarded the Presidential Metal of Freedom. The case outside Fellowship Hall has items of the Niebuhr's given to St. John and there is also a Niebuhr collection of books & memorabilia in the Library at Lincoln College. The youngest son, H. Richard pastored a church upon graduation from Eden for 3 years in St. Louis, Mo. His life then returned to journalism (his first job was as a reporter in Lincoln 1915-1916). He was a theologian and teacher at Harvard Divinity School until health intervened. He died in 2017 at the age of 90.

The most familiar member of the Niebuhr family to most St. John members was Sister Adele Hosto, sister of Rev. Niebuhr's wife, Lydia. Sister Adele, her Christian name was from her mother's friend, Adelheid Schmidt (former pastor's wife) She took her vows on



December 27, 1914 and remained a dedicated servant until her death in 1975 Sister Adele will be remembered for her Scrabble games and making

her Stamp art cards with the young people and visits in the Extended Care wing of ALMH.

The Niebuhr grave site in Lincoln is the site of Pastor Gustav, wife Lydia, Hulda and Lydia's sister, Sister Adele Hosto.
