Why Do a Proclamation?

A proclamation is an official designation of an event, like Week of the Young Child™. Proclamations are a great way to educate the public and bring attention to the cause of high-quality early childhood education. A proclamation is effective for gaining public recognition—and serving as an advocacy tool for the future—because it carries the full support of a key government official in your state or community.

Step 1: Coordinate With Your States' Affiliates & Partners

Every elected official should receive just one request for a WOYC proclamation! Make sure you're connecting and coordinating with <u>your states' NAEYC Affiliates</u> and partners to figure out who is responsible for getting the right requests to the right people! And speaking of those right people, here are some options for who you might consider reaching out to:

- · City Proclamation: For city proclamations, a mayor, city manager, or city marshal may be the person to sign.
- County Proclamation: For county proclamation, it will be the county commissioners who will sign.
- State Proclamation: For state proclamation, it will be the governor who will sign.

Step 2: Make Contact With Your Elected Officials

Once you've figured out which offices you're reaching out to, check their websites for forms and guidelines on how to submit a proclamation. You can also call their office directly, and be ready to share the following information:

- The purpose of the proclamation (e.g. Expressing Support for Early Childhood Educators during the Week of the Young Child)
- The date when the proclamation is needed (if there is an event that you are trying to work around, be specific; otherwise, be flexible about the day during the WOYC)
- A brief history of your organization
- The name and contact information of the point of contact

Find out how they would like you to share the proclamation language that you will draft.

There is just one big charge for this year's #WOYC22 proclamation effort: to go beyond "thanks and recognition" for early childhood educators!

Step 3: Write the Proclamation Language (Using the Template Options)

On the following pages, we've provided you with some options to review and select for your proclamations. A few things to remember:

- You may need to fill in data to fit with your community and state. NAEYC has gathered links to state-specific fact sheets created by national organizations in one, easy-to-find and easy-to-access location. We encourage you to start with this compilation and check out NAEYC.org/pandemic-surveys for extensive national and state data you can use as well.
- You should not select all of the options in each category. Please pick and choose the messages and data points that will work best for your community and the person you've identified to sign the proclamation!
- You should feel free to adapt the language to fit your community's context.

Step 4: Make It a Big Deal!

COVID-19 has upended many of our traditions, yet celebrating a WOYC proclamation should not be one of them! Choose one of the options below to celebrate your WOYC proclamation.

Option 1: Host a Virtual Signing Event

Choose your favorite meeting platform, invite members of your community, and join your elected official as they sign and read the proclamation. Remember to record the celebration and take pictures of your screen.

Option 2: Participate in an In-Person Proclamation Meeting or Signing Event

If your elected official is hosting in-person events, make sure to follow the guidelines that are given as to whom, and how many individuals, you can bring to the proclamations meeting or singing event. Remember to take pictures!

Once you have your celebration pictures, make sure to promote your new proclamation through social media by posting on Facebook, Twitter, and/or Instagram, using the hashtags #WOYC22 and #SolveChildCare, and tagging @NAEYC, as well as your own elected officials. You can also promote the proclamation through traditional media by sending a copy of the proclamation to your local newspapers and offering to talk about the critical and essential role early childhood educators play in providing high-quality child care and early learning to support children and families in your community.

WHEREAS

Start With Children

- The first years of a child's life are the period of the most rapid brain development and lay the foundation for all future learning.
- Children's cognitive, physical, social and emotional, and language and literacy development are built on a foundation of children's positive interactions with adults, peers, and their environment.
- ☐ There are XX number of children birth through age 8 in our state / community, XX% of whom live in low—income families.

Working Families

- XX% of children in our state have all available parents in the workforce.
- High percentage of mothers return work in the first six weeks after the birth of a child.
- XX% of eligible families do not receive child care assistance due to lack of funding.
- XX% of parents have had to leave or change jobs due to challenges with child care.
- Nationwide, women are quitting their jobs at a higher rate than men. That gender quit gap is widest in the states with the most child care disruptions.

Benefits of High-Quality Early Childhood Education

- High-quality early childbood programs provide important benefits to children, families and our state and national economies.
- High quality early care and education can help ameliorate the effects of poverty, detect and remediate delays, identify and help prevent child neglect, and lead to positive outcomes for individual children, helping them be better prepared for school and more likely to succeed in life.
- Paying the costs of high-quality early childhood education is a revenue-generating investment over time, resulting in a broad range of benefits that accrue to individuals and society at large.
- Participation in high-quality early childhood education saves taxpayer dollars, makes working families more economically secure, and prepares children to aucceed in school, earn higher wages, and live healthier lives.

WHEREAS

Role of Early Childhood Educators

- High-quality early childhood education depends on high-quality early childhood educators who ensure that children, supported by families, have the early experiences they need for a strong foundation.
- Many early childhood educators do not have equitable, affordable access to needed early childhood education credentials and degrees. XX% of early childhood educators in STATE / NATIONALLY have earned degrees.
- Many early childhood educators earn poverty-level wages and do not have basic workplace benefits, such as health insurance and paid sick leave. XX% of child care workers in STATE / NATIONALLY make so little that they live in families accessing public benefits.
- Many early childhood educators will leave their positions each year, because they cannot afford to earn such low wages, often while supporting their own families. XX% of early childhood centers in STATE / NATIONALLY experience turnover each year.

- Since the start of the pandemic, 15,856 providers have closed their doors.
- The average wage for child care providers, who are skilled and valuable front-line professionals who have risked their health to provide education and care during a global pandemic, is less than \$13 per hour, with Black and Latina child care workers making even less.
- Many child care providers have, at great personal and professional cost, managed to keep their doors open during the pandemic in order to support children and families in their communities.

Cost of High-Quality Early Childhood Education

- At the same time, the cost of one year of child care for an infant in STATE averages \$XX,XXX and \$XX,XXX for a four-year old.
- The majority of these costs, which often exceed the cost of a year of college tuition, are borne by parents, who often can't afford it.
- Tuition from fee-paying parents and subsidy rates for families with low incomes are typically insufficient to afford highly-qualified, consistent early childhood educators and pay for low child-to-early educator ratios that ensure the health and safety of children.
- Payment rates provided to early childhood educators to provide high-quality early care and education services to low-income children do not cover the costs of quality.

Impact of the Pandemic

- ☐ The lack of sufficient public investment in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic has forced child care programs, educators, and families into a series of impossible choices with devastating consequences.
- The essential yet chronically undervalued child care sector has sacrificed and struggled to serve children and families since the start of the COVID pandemic.

AND WHEREAS YOUNG CHILDREN NEED

- Skilled, educated, competent, consistent, and compensated early childhood educators.
- Developmentally appropriate, accessible, and available early care and education settings.
- Access to an early childhood education workforce that reflects a rich diversity of linguistic, racial, and cultural identities.
- Early childhood educators who are incentivized and supported to provide high-quality care to those with high and special needs.

AND WHEREAS WORKING FAMILIES NEED

- Paid family leave.
- Mixed-delivery early childhood education system that allows them to choose between "quality" and "quality" when selecting the setting that best meets their needs.
- A strong regulatory structure to give them peace of mind that their children are safe and in high quality early care and education settings.
- Sufficient high-quality child care spaces beginning at birth to be available in the community.
- Robust subsidies, scholarships, and tax credits for families at all income levels that support the true cost of quality early childhood education.

AND WHEREAS EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATORS NEED

- Opportunities to acquire critical skills, knowledge, and competencies through pathways to credentials and higher education degrees, without incurring college debt.
- Ability to have basic workplace benefits such as health insurance, retirement, paid sick leave, paid vacation and professional development leave.
- Ability to earn a family–sustaining wage that is commensurate with the required education and skills they bring to the complex and valuable work they do.





Therefore, be it resolved that the state / city / county of XXX does hereby proclaim April 2–8 as the Week of the Young Child, and:

- does hereby recognize that high quality early childhood education, provided in a mixed-delivery system, is a public good, and should be financed as such.
- does hereby recognize the complex, valuable, essential, and demanding work of early childhood educators.
- does hereby recognize that when our society invests in educators, we also invest in children and families.
- declare that early childhood educators should be valued, respected, and compensated for the important roles they play.

- commit to the convening of a Task Force to study pathways to compensation parity for early childhood educators,
- calls on the Governor / legislative body to advance a bill streamlining articulation between two –and four -year colleges and universities.
- urge all members of our community to support efforts that increase children and families' access to high-quality early childhood education.
- commit to investments that stabilize, sustain, and support child care and early learning so this essential workforce can continue to support children, families, and our economy through the pandemic crisis, recovery, and beyond.

RE: Extended Race Time for Lincoln Speedway

Background: On Monday, March 6, 2023 the council voted to approve the Tentative Race Schedule for Lincoln Speedway for 2023. Council discussed that there are a few big races, if the city would like to grant the Speedway thirty (30) minutes of additional racing time. I reached out to Adam Mackey with the Lincoln Speedway for him to give the council up to three (3) dates that he could take advantage of thirty (30) extra minutes passed the required stop time. Those dates are listed as follows.

Thursday, May 11, 2023 (\$23,023 to win Super Late model Race) Sunday, June 25, 2023 (Summer National Tour) Friday, September 29, 2023/Saturday, September 30, 2023 (Fall Nationals)

<u>City Council Recommendation</u>: To be placed on the Regular City Council Meeting for Monday, March 20, 2023.

Information Technology Maintenance and Administration

- 1. Term. We shall provide support and maintenance for existing and future IT infrastructure. Beginning on May 1st 2023 and effective until the end of the fiscal budget year. Renewal shall be automatic unless either party has given 60 days' notice of intent to terminate.
- 2. Maintenance and Administration Fees. From the signing date of this contract until the end of the fiscal year, we shall provide services for the consideration of \$66,000, payable in 12 monthly payments in the amount of \$5500, on the first business day after each voting session of each month, starting on the beginning of the fiscal year referenced in this contract. Before the contract is renewed, both parties shall agree upon future rates for each additional fiscal year. If no agreement can be reached, either party shall be allowed to terminate. Failure to pay within 30 days shall be considered a breach of contract and services may be withheld or terminated until payment has been satisfied.
- 3. Maintenance Services and Administration. Maintenance and administration are defined as service to ensure the proper function of the current IT infrastructure and any technology implemented in the future deemed necessary by the City of Lincoln. We provide no warranty for existing equipment unless it was purchased from Notto Technology & Consulting, LLC and is still within the warranty period. Monthly maintenance will likely include updates to software and hardware and replacement of equipment that is expected to fail but is still operational. Hardware and software shall be provided at the expense of the City of Lincoln. We shall notify the City of Lincoln of any possible downtime and make reasonable efforts to minimize downtime during the normal working day.
- 4. Client Responsibilities. Remote support may be provided from time to time. The City of Lincoln is responsible for connectivity and security standards to ensure they are in compliance with CJIS. RE: New Street Department Employee

Background

The Street Department has nine full time employees currently, the ninth employee was hired in January as a replacement due to a retirement. At one point the Street Department had thirteen employees in the early nineties. When I became superintendent in 2014, there were seven active employees on staff and two that were inactive for various reasons. Eventually it was possible to replace the two inactive employees bringing the staff back to eight. In 2018, a nineth employee was added. Since 2020, the department has had three employees retire with an average of thirty two and a half years of service.

Analysis/Discussion

With the savings of entry level employees replacing the long-term employees I believe it is a good time to add one additional staff member. This additional employee will add in improving the level of service to the citizens of Lincoln. An additional staff member will help reduce response times in critical service such as snow and ice control, storm damage cleanup and flooding. It will also help in reducing delays in completing projects in many areas.

Fiscal Impact

During planning for the 2022/2023 budget the intent was to hire the replacement employee in August, that salary was included in the 2022/2023 budget for August to April. That employee wasn't hired till mid-January. This would leave funds available to pay the salary for the new employee the remainder of the year. Additionally, funds were allocated in 2022/2023 appropriations budget in consideration of a tenth employee.

If the new employee had a start date of April 1, 2023, the salary for one month would be \$3755.40. The new employee salary for the 2023/2024 budget will be \$3,905.93, per month or \$46,871.16, for the budget year.

City Engineer - Request for Proposals Review

Background

At the direction of the City Council request for proposals regarding professional engineering services were advertised. A committee was formed that consisted of Mayor Welch, Alderman Sam Downs, and Rob Jones. Other members were Wes Woodhall, Andrew Bowns, and myself. Four proposals were received and out of those four only 3 were considered. Those firms were CM&T, Farnsworth Group and Fehr Graham.

Analysis/Discussion

To be completely fair to all firms a grading matrix was created. The first section was based off cost of services, response time, resources, qualifications, capabilities and understanding of requested services. The second section was based on the answers given to a list of interview questions put together by the committee. Each member of the committee scored the answers independently during the interview. The scores from both sections were then calculated to come up with the total score for each firm, those scores were as follows.

Farnsworth Group - 225

Fehr Gram - 221.2

CM&T - 217.4

Based off the results of our review of these proposals the committee's recommendation to the council is to award the contract engineering position to Farnsworth Group.
