KANSAS STATE KICKS OFF PRINCE ERA

Kansas State opens its 111th season of intercollegiate football on Saturday at 6:10 p.m., when the Wildcats welcome Illinois State to Bill Snyder Family Stadium.

The contest will mark the K-State debut of first-year head coach Ron Prince. Prince was named as the Wildcats' head football coach on Dec. 5, 2005, after serving the last three seasons as offensive coordinator at Virginia.

Saturday's season-opener will also feature the official dedication of Bill Snyder Family Stadium in a pre-game ceremony that is slated to begin approximately 20 minutes before kickoff. The stadium dedication will include an on-the-field ceremony, a video tribute highlighting Bill Snyder's incredible career at K-State and the public unveiling of new stadium signage.

K-State's football facility was renamed Bill Snyder Family Stadium in honor of the winningest football coach in school history by a proclamation of the Kansas Board of Regents on Nov. 16, 2005. Snyder announced his retirement as head coach on Nov. 15, 2005, after 17 years at the helm.

There is no live television scheduled for the game. However, the Kansas State Sports Information office will provide a satellite uplink package of highlights between 9:15-9:35 p.m. (CT) on SBS 6, Transponder 3 (KU band).

The game will air live on radio across the 31-station K-State Sports Network. Wyatt Thompson will call the action, with former Wildcat quarterback Stan Weber providing the analysis. Matt Walters will serve as the broadcast crew's sideline reporter.

A QUICK LOOK AT THE WILDCATS

New Kansas State head coach Ron Prince will open his debut campaign with a veteran roster that features 40 returning lettermen, including a Big 12 leading 19 starters. The Wildcats also return statistical leaders from 2005 in virtually every offensive and defensive category.

Senior quarterback Dylan Meier, who passed for 1,436 yards and nine TDs in six starts during 2004, missed all of 2005 with an injury but will get the call to open the 2006 season under center after winning a heated battle with talented freshman Josh Freeman to run K-State's new-look offense. He should have plenty of targets to choose from as the Wildcats return four of their top five pass-catchers from a year ago. Senior Carlos Alsup will get the starting nod at running back in place of senior Thomas Clayton, K-State's leading rusher in 2005, who will sit out the season-opener for disciplinary reasons.

On defense, senior linebacker Brandon Archer makes the move to the weakside after leading the Cats in tackles each of the last two seasons. The All-Big 12 and Butkus candidate will once again be expected to lead an experienced unit that includes nine players with starting experience.



THE SERIES... first meeting

Saturday's season-opener will mark the first-ever meeting on the gridiron between Kansas State and Illinois State... K-State is 8-3 all-time vs. current members of the Gateway Conference... ONE-HUNDRED ELEVEN AND COUNTING

Kansas State will be celebrating its 111th season of college football in 2006 and the start of its second decade as a member of the Big 12 Conference. The Wildcats enter 2006 with an all-time record of 435-578-41 (.432), with nearly a third (31.3 percent) of those victories coming in the last 17 years under former Head Coach Bill Snyder (136-68-1).

WINNING DEBUTS

For the first time in 17 years, Kansas State will open a season with a new head coach. Ron Prince, the Wildcats' 33rd head coach, will be looking to continue a trend of winning first-game performances. All time, K-State's 32 previous head coaches have gone a combined 18-12-2 in their debut games with the Wildcats. The last K-State coach to win his inaugural game was Stan Parrish, who opened his stint in Manhattan with a 35-7 win over current Gateway Conference member Western Illinois in 1986. Unfortunately, he would win just once more during his K-State career before Bill Snyder took over prior to the 1989 season.

ROOKIE RECORDS

Ron Prince is Kansas State's 33rd head football coach and the 32nd man to hold the job. K-State's previous head coaches have enjoyed varied levels of success in their rookie seasons, however just five produced winning seasons in the inaugural campaigns at the helm of the Wildcat football program. K-State's last first-year coach to produce a winning record in his debut season was Pappy Waldorf, who led the Cats to a 7-2-1 mark and the 1934 Big 6 title. Kansas State's Ron Prince is one of 11 new head coaches in college football for the 2006 season. EIGHT IS GREAT

Kansas State will certainly play a fan-friendly schedule in 2006. The Wildcats are slated to play a total of eight home games in Bill Snyder Family Stadium this season. Additionally, K-State will only leave the Sunflower State a total of three times during the entire campaign. The Cats' eight 2006 home games are tied for the most home games in a season in school history. Kansas State also played eight home games during the 2002 campaign and the Big 12 Championship season of 2003, going 7-1 at home each year.

WILDCAT WALK

Kansas State head coach Ron Prince and the Wildcats will unveil the start of what is hoped will become an exciting tradition at Kansas State prior to the 2006 season opener vs. Illinois State. Called the "Wildcat Walk," K-State players and coaches will be dropped off approximately two-and-a-half hours prior to each game at Gate 3 on College Avenue in the west parking lot of Bill Snyder Family Stadium. The team will then make its way to the stadium through the parking lot on foot, eventually entering the facility through Gate C. The program is encouraging fans to participate in the "Wildcat Walk" throughout the season by lining a path to the stadium and greeting the players as they arrive on game day.

IN THE CAPTAIN'S CHAIR

Four players were selected by their teammates this spring to serve as captains for the 2006 season. Junior wide receiver Jordy Nelson and senior offensive lineman Greg Wafford received the nod from the offense, with senior linebacker Brandon Archer and senior defensive lineman Blake Seiler picked to represent the defense. While Nelson, Wafford and Seiler will be new to the roles, Archer is back as a team captain for his second straight year after severing the 2005 season as one of the Cats' three captains.

Ron Prince, who developed a reputation as one of the nation's top young coaching talents during his tenure as Virginia's offensive coordinator, was named the 33rd head football coach at Kansas State on Dec. 5, 2005.

Currently the third-youngest head coach in all of Division I-A, Prince brought 13 years of collegiate coaching experience with him to Kansas State from Virginia, where he has served the last five seasons as Cavaliers' offensive line coach, including the past three as the architect of UVA's offensive attack.

While at Virginia, Prince, 36, helped usher in a new era of success as the Cavaliers' earned straight bowl berths from 2002-05 and set a dozen team and individual school records. Prince also produced 10 offensive NFL draft picks during his stint at UVA, while 37 Cavaliers earned All-ACC distinction, including 17 on the offensive side of the ball. Of those 17 offensive selections, 11 occurred with Prince at the controls of the Cavs' offense.

A 1988 graduate of Junction City High School, Prince played two seasons at Dodge City (Kan.) Community College, receiving All-Conference honors as an offensive tackle on the field and Academic All-America and National Dean's List accolades for his performance in the classroom.

In 1990, Prince transferred to Appalachian State in Boone, N.C. He played two seasons for the Mountaineers and helped ASU to a Southern Conference championship and a berth in the NCAA I-AA playoffs as a senior in 1991 before earning a bachelor's degree in history in 1992.

Prince received his start in coaching shortly after graduation, returning to Kansas in 1992 to serve as a volunteer assistant coach at Dodge City.

After just one season, Prince began his full-time coaching career as an offensive line at Alabama A&M in 1993. An ultra-successful one-year stop at South Carolina State in 1994 followed before Prince took over as the offensive line coach at James Madison in 1995 and then at Cornell in 1998.

Born in Omaha, Neb., but raised in Junction City by parents Ernest and Georgeanne Prince, he is married to the former Zoë Ahern of Valhalla, N.Y. The couple has four children, Deuce (6), James (4), Grace (3) and John (1).

'CATS, 'BIRDS MEETING FOR FIRST TIME

Saturday's game between Kansas State and Illinois State will be the first between the two programs on the gridiron. And though the Wildcats have never previously squared off with ISU in football, K-State has faced a number of the Redbirds' Gateway Conference brethren through the years. Most recently, Kansas State opened the 2002 and 2004 seasons with victories over Western Kentucky to improve to 8-3 all time vs. current Gateway conference members. Illinois State is the only NCAA Division I-AA member on the docket for 2006. Since 1989, the Wildcats have played 11 I-AA members and posted a 10-1 record in those games.

LAND OF LINCOLN LEDGER

A win over Illinois State on Saturday would improve Kansas State to 8-3 all time vs. teams from the Land of Lincoln. The Wildcats' most recent encounter vs. an Illinois-based team came during the 2002 season, when the Wildcats defeated Eastern Illinois, 63-13, in Manhattan.

THE WORD ON THE 'BIRDS

Kansas State will be squaring off with a battle-tested side when the Wildcats meet Illinois State in Saturday's season opener. Head coach Denver Johnson returns a total of 16 starters - 8 on offense and 8 on defense - from last year's 7-4 squad that tied for fourth in the Gateway Conference. The Redbird offense is expected to be led by the potent 1-2 punch of quarterback Luke Drone and running back Pierre Rembert. Drone passed for just shy of 3,000 yards (2,930) and 22 touchdowns a year ago. His favorite target, Laurént Robinson, also returns for the Redbirds after hauling in 86 receptions for 1,465 yards and 12 scores last season. Rembert, a transfer from Michigan, rushed for 801 yards in 10 games to lead the ISU ground attack a year ago. On defense, linebacker Cameron Siskowic, is back after leading the Gateway Conference in tackles during 2005 with 132 total stops.

REDBIRDS NO STRANGERS TO I-A COMPETITION

Illinois State, which boasts seven former NCAA Division I-A players on its roster, is no stranger to I-A competition. When the Redbirds line up vs. the Wildcats on Saturday in Bill Snyder Family Stadium it will mark the 12th straight season that ISU has played a I-A opponent. Last year, the Redbirds opened at Iowa State and gave the Cyclones all they wanted, tying the game at 15-15 late in the third quarter before falling 32-21 in Ames.

'CAT-'BIRD CONNECTIONS

Saturday's game will be a homecoming of sorts for two Illinois State staffers. Redbird director of athletics **Dr. Sheahon Zenger** returns to his old stomping grounds in Manhattan after taking the helm of the ISU athletics department in 2005. Zenger, a 1988 K-State grad, served several stints with the Wildcat athletics department during his career and most recently worked as the associate athletics director for development from 2002-05. **Doug Banks**, Illinois State's assistant athletics director for annual giving, served six years in the K-State development office before assuming his current role with the Redbirds.

K-STATE: A SEASON-OPENING SUCCESS STORY

Kansas State will put its 16-game winning streak in season openers on the line when the Wildcats face Illinois State Saturday. The winning streak is currently the longest string of consecutive season-opening wins in school history. Kansas State's 16-game winning streak in season openers dates back to the 1990 campaign, when K-State defeated Western Illinois, 27-6.

CATS ON A ROLL

The Wildcats have not dropped a season opener since former head coach Bill Snyder's inaugural campaign at Kansas State in 1989, when the Cats lost at Arizona State, 31-0, in Sun Devil Stadium on Sept. 9, 1989. Since then the Wildcats have won 16 straight season lid-lifters, including 11 at home, two on the road and two at neutral sites. K-State's last loss at home in a season-opener dates to the 1987 season, when the Cats were upset by Austin Peay.

HOME RUN

Saturday's game vs. Illinois State marks the third straight time and the fourth time in the last six seasons that Kansas State will make its season debut in Manhattan. It is the first time since the 1990 through 1996 seasons, when K-State opened seven straight years at home, that the Wildcats have opened on Wagner Field in three successive campaigns.

FAST STARTS

Kansas State has been a quick-starting team in season openers in recent years. Since 1990, the Wildcats have averaged just over 34 points in season debuts and have been held to fewer than 21 points just once. K-State has hit the 40-point mark on five occasions, including a high of 66 points in the Cats' 1998 debut vs. Indiana State. Most recently, Kansas State topped 40 points in its 2002 and 2003 openers, defeating Western Kentucky, 48-3, and California, 42-28, respectively. Last year, K-State opened the year with a 35-21 win over Florida International.

NON-CONFERENCE NOTABLES

Kansas State has been one of the most dominant sides in all of college football in non-conference play over the last decade. The Wildcats enter 2006 riding a four-game winning streak vs. non-conference opponents and have posted perfect non-conference ledgers eight times in the last 10 years, including a 3-0 mark last season. In all non-conference games over the last decade (Big 12 era), the Wildcats own a 36-6 (.857) record, with a 32-2 (.941) mark in non-conference regular-season tilts.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME

Few teams in college football have taken care of their home field as well as the Wildcats since the start of the 1990 season. Over the past 16 years, K-State is an amazing 87-16-1 (.841) when playing on Wagner Field, including a 43-11-1 (.790) mark in league games (combined Big 8/Big 12). During that stretch, the Wildcats have lost more than once at home in just three seasons and hit the six win mark at home eight times. Kansas State set the school record for home victories in a season with seven four times, doing so as recently as 2003.

SIZZLING SEPTEMBERS

Fast starts have propelled the Wildcats to winning seasons throughout the Big 12 era at Kansas State. Since the start of the 1996 season, K-State is a combined 29-3 (.906) in games played during the month of September. The lone losses during that stretch occurred in 2004 vs. Fresno State, in 2003 vs. Marshall and in 2001 at then-No. 3 Oklahoma.

PRESEASON POLLS TOUGH ON THE CATS

Despite returning a Big 12 Conference-high 17 starters on offense and defense from a team that came within an eyelash of playing in its 12th bowl game in the last 13 years, Kansas State received little recognition from the league's media in the 2006 preseason poll as the Wildcats were tapped to finish sixth in the conference's North Division. It marks the first time in the 11 years of the Big 12 preseason media poll that the Cats have been picked to bring up the rear in the North. K-State didn't fare much better in the preseason magazines as the Wildcats were picked to finish no higher than tied for fourth by most preseason prognosticators.

K-STATE LOOKS TO OUTPERFORM BIG 12 PRESEASON MEDIA POLL AGAIN

For the first time in the history of the Big 12, Kansas State has been tapped to finish sixth in the league's North Division by media that regularly cover the conference. The good news for first-year head coach Ron Prince and the Wildcats is that historically K-State has outperformed its preseason ranking. In the previous 10 Big 12 preseason polls, Kansas State has fared better than predicted five times, while finishing up worse than projected three times. In fact, K-State has fished where predicted just twice - 1996 (third) and 2003 (first). Prior to being tapped for fifth last year, Kansas State had been projected no lower than third (1996, 1997, 1999 and 2002) by the Big 12's media. The Wildcats have also been pegged to finish second three times (1998, 2000 and 2001) and first twice (2003 and 2004).

NEW BOWL TIES FOR BIG 12

The 2006 season will usher in a new series of bowl tie-ins for the Big 12 Conference, which reached agreements with the Gator*, Sun* and Insight bowls during the off-season. As a result, the league ended previous arrangements with the Champs Sports and Fort Worth bowls. The new agreements, which run through the 2009 season, coincide with the league's agreements for the balance of its bowl contracts with the Fiesta, Cotton, Holiday, Alamo, Independence and Houston bowls. Here's a look at the new Big 12 bowl lineup:

WHAT COULD HAVE BEEN

Kansas State may have finished the season with a 5-6 record, but the Wildcats weren't far from having a much better finish. With three losses by three points or less on the year, K-State was just nine points away from posting an 8-3 mark and would have been bowl eligible for the 12th time in the last 13 years had any one of the three heartbreakers gone the other way.

TOUGH LOVE

Kansas State suffered more than its fair share of heartbreakers during the 2005 season. In all, the Wildcats played four games that were decided by three points or less, but came out on the winning side just once. Three of those losses occurred during a four week stretch late in the season that eliminated K-State from bowl consideration. After holding on for a 21-19 road win at Marshall in game two, the Wildcats' luck began to turn South with a 30-28 loss to Texas A&M. A 23-20 last-second setback vs. Colorado followed before a 27-25 loss at Nebraska, that was also decided on a field goal in the final minutes, sealed the Cats' fate.

CATS HAVE PLENTY OF EXPERIENCE

New coach Ron Prince may be in his first year as a head coach, but he certainly won't be working with a slew of inexperience players. In fact, Prince has inherited a battle-tested team that got plenty of experience as a young unit in 2005. The Wildcats return a total of 40 lettermen (19-offense/17-defense/4-specialist), including 29 who have made at least one career start. Eight of the returnees started at least six games on offense a year ago, with eight starting at least six games on defense. K-State also returns starters at punter, place-kicker and long-snapper.

BY THE NUMBERS

In addition to playing experience, Kansas State returns virtually all of its statistical playmakers for 2006. Though the Wildcats lost all of their passing production from last season following the transfers of quarterbacks Allan Evridge and Allen Webb, the program does return 73 percent of the squad's passing yardage from 2004 in senior **Dylan Meier**, who missed all of 2005. The Cats also return 94 percent of their rushing output, including 2005's top gainer on the ground, **Thomas Clayton**, and 81 percent of their receiving yards, with five of the top six pass-catchers from 2005 back on campus. On defense, K-State returns 76 percent of its tackle production, including seven of its top eight tacklers, 75 percent of its interception production and 82 percent of its forced fumble production.

IRON WILDCATS

Nine Wildcats who return for 2006 - three on offense and six on defense - started all 11 games during 2005. Kansas State's offensive ironmen include, **John Hafferty**, **Greg Wafford** and **Jordy Nelson**. On defense, **Blake Seiler**, **Quintin Echols**, **Brandon Archer**, **Maurice Mack**, **Bryan Baldwin** and **Marcus Watts** were in K-State's starting lineup in every game.

FIRST-TIMERS

According to Kansas State's projected depth chart, as many as 10 Wildcats could make their first career starts in Saturday's season-opener vs. Illinois State. Kansas State's potential first-time starters on offense include left tackle **Nick Stringer**, right guard **Gerard Spexarth**, right tackle **Michael Frieson** and fullback **John McCardle**. On defense, left end **Ian Campbell**, nose tackle **Steven Cline**, right end **Rob Jackson**, strongside linebacker **Reggie Walker**, middle linebacker **Zach Diles** and free safety **Andrew Erker** could all draw their first career starts. Last season, a total of 12 different Wildcats made their first career starts in K-State's season opener vs. FIU.

CENTURY MARKS

Kansas State will be out to continue a trend of dominant rushing performances in season openers when the Wildcats meet Illinois State Saturday. K-State has had a 100-yard rusher in its season opener 16 times in school history, including six straight and seven of its last eight season debuts. Last year, Thomas Clayton rushed for 177 yards vs. Florida Atlantic to keep the string intact. The Wildcats have also posted double 100-yard rushers in a season opener twice since 2000 - 2001 and 2003.

SCORING STREAK

Kansas State extended its consecutive games scoring streak to 115 in its season-ending victory over Missouri. The 115-game stretch is a school record and the 13th longest in the nation as the Wildcats have not been kept off the scoreboard since Colorado blanked K-State, 12-0, in 1996. The previous longest streak in school history of 60 games also took place during the Bill Snyder era at Kansas State and occurred between 1991 and 1996. In the Big 12, only Colorado (207 games - sixth longest in the country) and Nebraska (122 games) own longer streaks than the Wildcats.



NEW SEASON, NEW QB

With **Dylan Meier**, a six-game starter during 2004, slated to open the season at quarterback when the Wildcats take the field Saturday vs. Illinois State, the 2006 season could mark the sixth straight year Kansas State will use a different starter under center in its season opener. Jonathan Beasley was the last quarterback to start back-to-back openers, doing so during the 1999 and 2000 seasons, respectively. Following Beasley, Eli Roberson sandwiched season-opening starts in 2001 and 2003 around Mark Dunn's in 2002. In 2004, Meier became the first Kansan to open a season under center for Kansas State in the Bill Snyder era vs. Western Kentucky. Still, it's not completely uncommon for the Wildcats to make a season debut with a different quarterback that the previous year. In fact, Chad May (1993 and 1994) and Michael Bishop (1997 and 1998) are the only quarterbacks other than Beasley to make successive opening-day starts since 1989 at Kansas State.

WATCH ME

Kansas State linebacker **Brandon Archer** and offensive lineman **Greg Wafford** have both been named to preseason watch lists for three of the nation's top postseason awards. Archer, K-State's leading tackler in each of the last two seasons is one of 65 players, including seven from the Big 12 Conference, named to the 2006 Butkus Award Watch List, given annually to the nation's best linebacker in college football. Archer is also listed on the watch list for the Nagurski Award, which goes to the nation's top defensive player. Wafford, the Cats' Co-Offensive Lineman of the Year for 2005, has been named to watch lists for both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy. Wafford is one of 100 players named to the Rotary Lombardi Award list, and one of just 54 players on the Outland Trophy watch list. The Lombardi Award honors the top offensive lineman, defensive lineman or linebacker in college football, while the Outland Trophy is given annually to the nation's top offensive or defensive lineman.

THESE GUYS ARE FAST

Who has the fastest wide receivers in the Big 12 Conference? According to *Sports Illustrated* Kansas State does. At 6-foot-2 and 213 pounds, junior Jordy Nelson and his 4.3 speed in the forty make for an imposing target. He lead all Wildcats last season with 45 receptions for 669 yards and eight scores, including a K-State record seven straight games with a TD to open the season. But the real speed merchant is senior Yamon Figurs. With 4.29 speed in the forty, Figurs rates as one of the Big 12's top deep threats and has averaged over 16 yards per catch as a Cat.

RECEIVING RECORD

Junior Jordy Nelson etched his name in the Kansas State record book last season with one of the most productive sophomore receiving campaigns in school history. Nelson's 45 receptions are the second most ever by a Wildcat sophomore, while his 669 receiving yards rank fourth all time on K-State's sophomore receiving chart and are just 127 shy of the the school's single-season top 10. On the scoring front, Nelson's eight receiving touchdowns rank as the seventh most in a season at Kansas State.

The Fox Sports Midwest territory of 4.2 million homes includes virtually all cable and satellite homes in the state of Kansas as well as the Kansas City market.

GO-TO GUYS

Jordy Nelson and Jermaine Moreira developed into the two main go-to receivers for Kansas State in 2005. For the season, the duo combined for 80 receptions (Nelson, 45 and Moreira, 35) and 1,154 yards. Those figures account for nearly 50 percent of Kansas State's pass receptions last season and over 52 percent of the Wildcats' receiving yardage. The twosome also tallied nine of K-State's 15 receiving touchdowns (60 percent).

CHART CLIMBING

Senior Jermaine Moreira topped 1,000 receiving yards for his career with his 101-yard performance against the Texas A&M Aggies last season. With 36 games under his belt, Moreira has racked up 1,168 receiving yards for his career, which currently stands as the 15th-most in school history. He needs just 365 receiving yards to crack K-State's top 10. The Wildcats' all-time career receiving yardage lead is Kevin Lockett, who totaled 3,032 yards from 1993-96.

MOREIRA ON THE MOVE

Senior Jermaine Moreira will enter his final season with 91 career receptions and is closing in on K-State's career receiving record books. Moreira needs just five more catches to move into 10th place all-time in school history in receptions and needs just nine more grabs to become the eighth player in school history to catch 100 passes for his career.

ARCHER ON TARGET

Senior team captain Brandon Archer, a second-team All-Big 12 selection by the *Kansas City Star* last season, closed out 2005 as the Wildcats' leading tackler for the second straight year. He finished the season with 72 tackles and also led K-State in tackles for losses with 9.5. For the season, Archer recorded five or more tackles in all 11 games, including a season-best nine at Oklahoma. He enters 2006 with at least five stops in 15 of his last 17 games dating back to 2004. In those 15 games, Archer led the Wildcat defense in tackles five times and collected 10 or more stops on three occasions.

CHASING TACKLES

On the career tackles front, Brandon Archer opens the 2006 season with 162 career stops and needs 84 this year to crack K-State's top 25 for total career tackles. Archer also moved into a first-place tie in interception returns for touchdowns at K-State with the third of his career against Missouri.

DIAL ZACH FOR TACKLES

Despite not starting a game in 2005, Zach Diles was a key producer for the Wildcat defense. Penciled in as the starter for Saturday's season opener, the senior finished the year fifth on the team in tackles with 50, including 5.5 for losses with two forced fumbles coming on sacks. After collecting a team-leading 11 tackles at Oklahoma, Diles posted five or more stops in five of the last six games of the season, including nine at Iowa State and seven vs. Missouri. He also posted a five-tackles outing and forced a fumble at Nebraska and notched six tackles vs. Texas A&M, including a sack of Reggie McNeal inside the five-yard line that led to a K-State touchdown.

FUTURE VISION

Sophomore linebacker Reggie Walker was one Wildcat who came on strong at the end of the season, perhaps giving K-State fans a glimpse of things to come. Despite collected just 16 tackles on the year, Walker was credited with 10 (8 solo) in the final two games. At Nebraska, Walker totaled five tackles, two for a loss, and a quarterback hurry against the Huskers. He tallied his tackles for losses on consecutive plays with the second one going for a safety as he ran down Nebraska running back Cory Ross in the end zone on a swing pass. He had five more stops in the season finale vs. Missouri, including a tackle for loss and a forced fumble in the fourth quarter during K-State's big comeback.

REWARDS PROGRAM

Kansas State head coach Ron Prince rewarded five walk-on football players, including safety Andrew Erker, offensive lineman Michael Frieson, wide receiver Daniel Gonzales, tight end Donald Raymer and place-kicker Tim Schwerdt, with football scholarships just prior to the start 2006 season. Erker, a sophomore from Olathe, is slated to make his first career start Saturday against Illinois State after not seeing any playing time last season. Frieson will also make his first career start Saturday for the Wildcats as the senior is expected to get the nod at right tackle. A big target at 6-foot-3, 216 pounds, Gonzales will also push for playing time at wide receiver and is currently working behind All-Big 12 performer Jordy Nelson heading into the season opener. Raymer will also be out to break into K-State's playing rotation this season, while Schwerdt, appeared in three games last year and is once again expected to battle for field time.
