For over 30 years, the Illinois Home Weatherization Assistance Program (IHWAP) has helped families live safely in their homes. Given the unprecedented economic challenges that Illinois and our nation are facing, the need for these services has never been greater. According to the 2000 census, there are nearly one million households in Illinois eligible for weatherization services under existing qualifying guidelines. This year alone, Illinois has experienced a threefold increase in applications for services.

Through the state's community action network, we are working to ensure Illinois' weatherization program will continue to be one of the best in the nation.

Illinois is administering \$242 million in American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funds over a three year period to provide more people with weatherization assistance. The end result will be 27,000 weatherized housing units, which is more than three times the typical annual production. Investment of these funds has also resulted in hundreds of new jobs being created, and is helping individuals reduce their energy consumption and realize savings in their energy bills. While this funding has not yet allowed us to meet all existing demand, ARRA was an important first step in our energy efficiency and job creation efforts.

Most importantly, the work that is being done through IHWAP is helping to bring families out of poverty and strengthen the fabric of our communities.

As we look ahead to the future, we will build on the existing success of the Illinois Home Weatherization Assistance Program. The State of Illinois remains committed to providing the best possible service for the people of this state.

WEATHERIZATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Program Overview

What is the purpose of the Weatherization Assistance Program?



The mission statement of the Weatherization Assistance Program is “To reduce energy costs for low-income families, particularly for the elderly, people with disabilities, and children, by improving the energy efficiency of their homes while ensuring their health and safety.”

When did Weatherization begin and why is it important?

The Weatherization Assistance Program was created in 1976 and today operates in all 50 states and the District of Columbia, and with Native American tribes. Funds provided by Congress are used to improve the energy efficiency of low-income homes using the most advanced technologies and testing protocols available in the housing industry. The energy conservation resulting from the efforts of state and local agencies helps our country reduce its dependency on foreign oil and decrease the cost of energy for families in need while improving health and safety of their homes.

How does the Weatherization Assistance Program operate in Illinois?

- The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) partners with the Department of Energy (DOE) to deliver the Weatherization Assistance Program.
- Thirty-five local agencies deliver energy efficient services to eligible residents across the state. Professionally trained staff use computerized energy audits and advanced diagnostic equipment to determine the most cost-effective energy efficiency measures appropriate for each home. Illinois crews also test heating units and appliances for carbon monoxide leaks and combustion safety.
- Typical weatherization services include installing insulation; sealing ducts; and mitigating heat loss through windows, doors, and other infiltration

points. Illinois weatherization workers also install health and safety measures, such as carbon monoxide detectors, smoke detectors, and fire extinguishers. Clients are educated on the proper use and maintenance of the installed measures.

How is the Weatherization Assistance Program funded?

- DCEO receives funding from DOE, the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS), and the state energy program. In addition to this funding, as result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), the state of Illinois received \$240 million over a three year period beginning in 2009, to expand the Weatherization Assistance Program in Illinois. This increased funding has allowed Illinois to more than double the 8,000 homes weatherized in a typical year.



How to Read This Report

This report is designed to demonstrate the production successes by the Illinois Home Weatherization Assistance Program as a result of the increased funding by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA). The data presented for the state and each agency that provides weatherization services, indicates the number of homes weatherized, and dollars spent.

Weatherized Homes*

- Each completed home has undergone an energy assessment/audit, the work has been performed, and a final inspection has taken place to verify that all work has been completed properly.
- “In progress” homes have undergone an energy assessment/audit and the work has been assigned to a contractor.
- The total number of homes completed, and indicated on the graph, is divided between those funded by ARRA dollars, and those funded by other funding sources (DOE dollars in addition to ARRA funding, HHS, State).
- Fiscal Year 2009 homes completed were funded by DOE, HHS, and State dollars, without the benefit of ARRA funding.

Jobs Created and Retained**

- The number of jobs created represents the number of Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) jobs that have been created as a result of ARRA funding. These jobs were added by the state of Illinois and at each administering agency to operate the program and increase the number of contractors and crews. It does not include the number of indirect jobs created at local businesses at which

building materials and other equipment has been purchased in order to expand the program.

- The number of jobs retained represents the number of FTE jobs that would not have been able to remain if not for the additional ARRA funding.

Dollars Spent*

- The total number of dollars spent for Fiscal Year 2010, indicates the number of dollars that have been dispersed into the state/counties as a result of the Weatherization Assistance Program.
- ARRA funding dollars indicate funds that have been dispersed into the state/counties during Fiscal Year 2010 through ARRA.

Return on Investment***

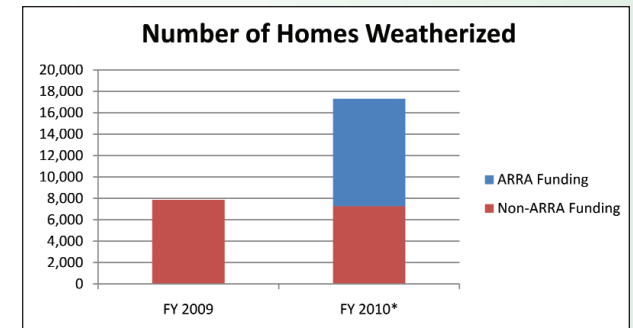
- Average Weatherization savings per household is \$437 per year on utility bills.
- On average a weatherized home saves 29 MBtu’s of energy per year (average Weatherization Assistance Program eligible home uses 84 MBtu’s per year).
- Weatherization reduces carbon dioxide emissions by 2.65 metric tons per home per year.
- For every \$1 invested in weatherizing a home, \$1.80 is saved.

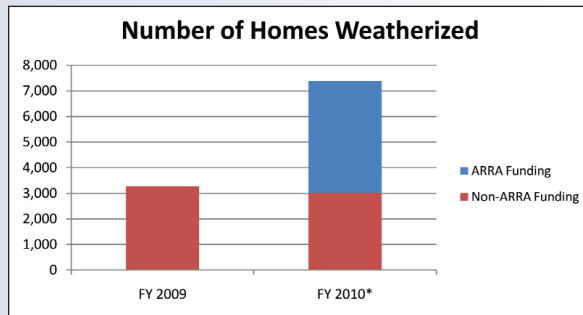
J. Pipes Company

Joe Pipes, 30, always dreamed of owning his own business and he succeeded three years ago when he started the J. Pipes Company in Waukegan, Ill. He completed the Black Chamber of Commerce's Small Business Contractor Academy, where he received help preparing his business plan and secured his license. Joe's business really took off after an employee of Community Action Partnership (CAP) of Lake County introduced Joe to the organization's Weatherization Assistance Program. Staff at CAP of Lake County helped Joe obtain a contract. Because of the increased workload he was able to hire more employees who had weatherization experience. He currently has three employees and has provided on-the-job training to 12 apprentices. Joe can now say that he makes enough profit to sustain his capital and has pulled himself, his wife and his six kids out of a financial bind.

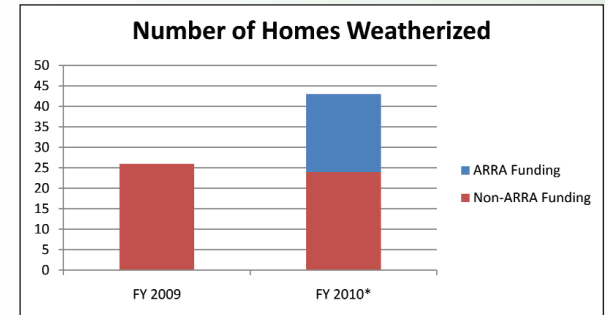
Ray Graham Association for People with Disabilities

Ray Graham Association for People with Disabilities supports and works with people with disabilities, their families and the community to improve the individual's quality of life. Because of the work of the DuPage County Weatherization Assistance Program, 11 individuals and Ray Graham staff experienced a significant upgrade in their quality of life. The newly installed doors, windows, thermostats and air-conditioning units allowed the residents to better regulate temperatures and produced a significant cost savings. The newly insulated attic and crawlspace, and tuned-up boilers and plumbing also helped to save money and ensured that heat on demand is a reality. Overall, the quality of life for these 11 individuals was greatly enhanced, safety issues were addressed, temperature control was realized, energy efficiencies were gained and costs were reduced, resulting in thousands of dollars of savings over the long term.

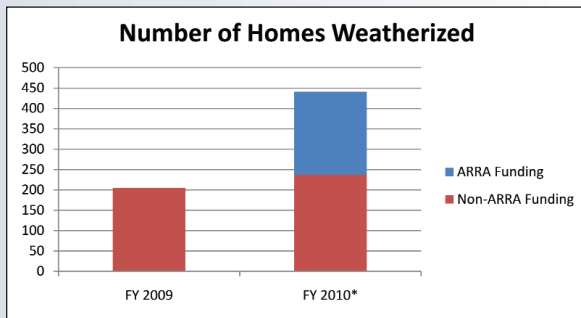
Carole Skinner Story

Carole Skinner owns a 102-year-old home in Stonington, Ill. On a cold January morning in 2009, Carole's furnace went out. She didn't know what to do. She knew she couldn't afford to call someone listed in the phone book. She first thought to call Attorney General Lisa Madigan's Office, where she learned she qualified for the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) through C.E.F.S Economic Opportunity Corporation. Carole contacted C.E.F.S. and filled out an application for the program. Within about 10 days she had a new furnace. Last summer, through WAP, Skinner also had her home insulated and new weatherstripping was installed around her back door. "My home is tight now," said Carole. "It's a major blessing what C.E.F.S. has done for me."
