Report Summary

Bicycle and Kick Scooter Safety: Children and Adults need to practice safety as they ride. A bicycle and a kick scooter needs to follow the rules of the road just like any other vehicle. This includes riding in the same direction as the flow of traffic and making a complete stop at stop signs. It is always a good idea to wear a helmet.

Lincoln Police responded to 847 incidents for the month and 87 case reports were written for the month. Officers responded to 27 vehicle crashes. Patrol officers wrote 49 citations and 23 warnings for the month along with 1 City Ordinance Citation.

Of the 39 arrests for the month, officers arrested several for, driving with suspended/revoked drivers license, warrants, and DUI. Of the 39 arrest, there were 3 incidents were the officers had to use force to gain control of the offender. Detectives continued investigations on 15 cases including participating in CIEG task force operations.

The K9 unit focused on training this month.

DARE contributed to 4 different youth activities this month.

The goals of well-founded SRO programs include providing safe learning environments in our community's schools, providing valuable resources to school staff members, fostering positive relationships with youth, developing strategies to resolve problems affecting youth and protecting all students, so that they can reach their fullest potentials.

There were 27 crashes the Lincoln Police Department responded to for the month of July.

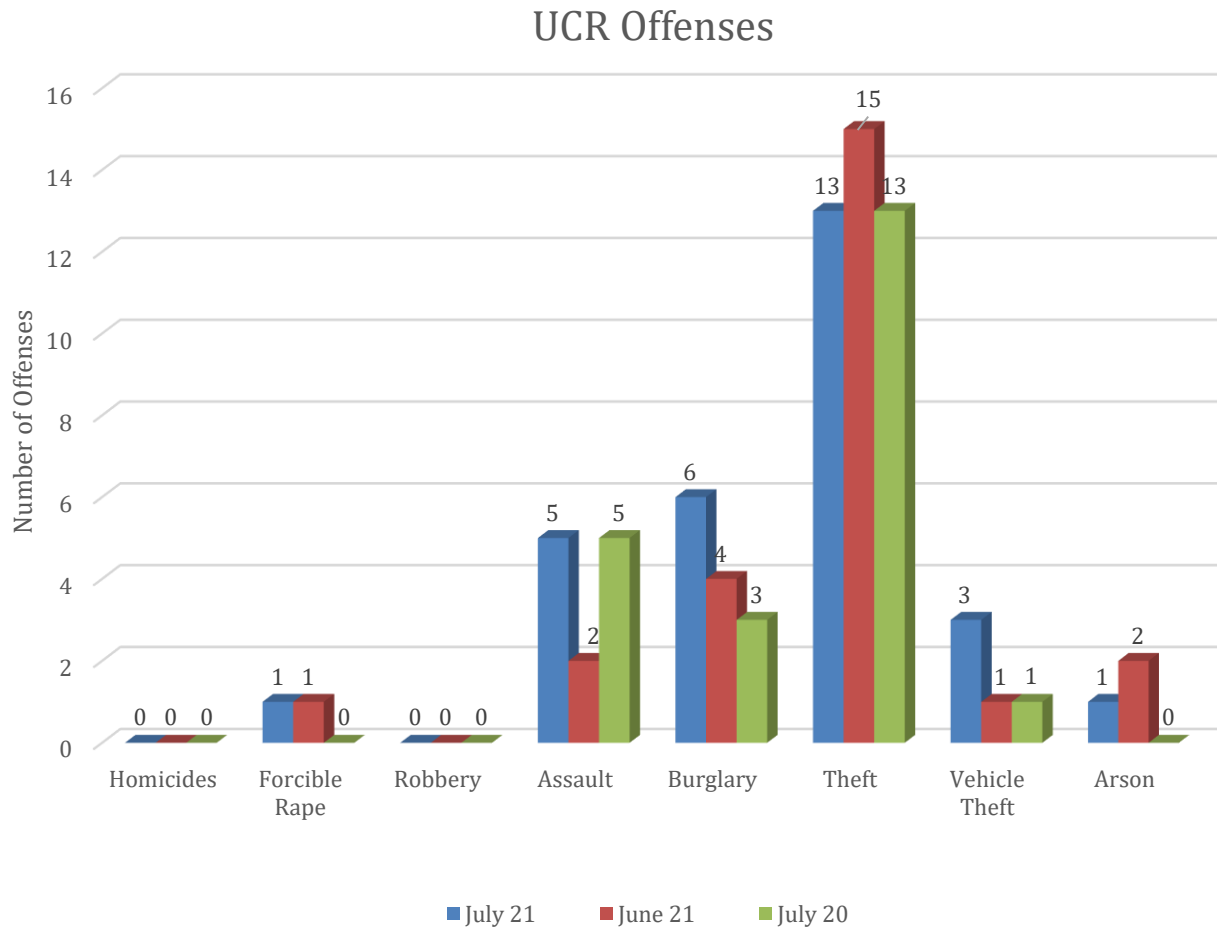

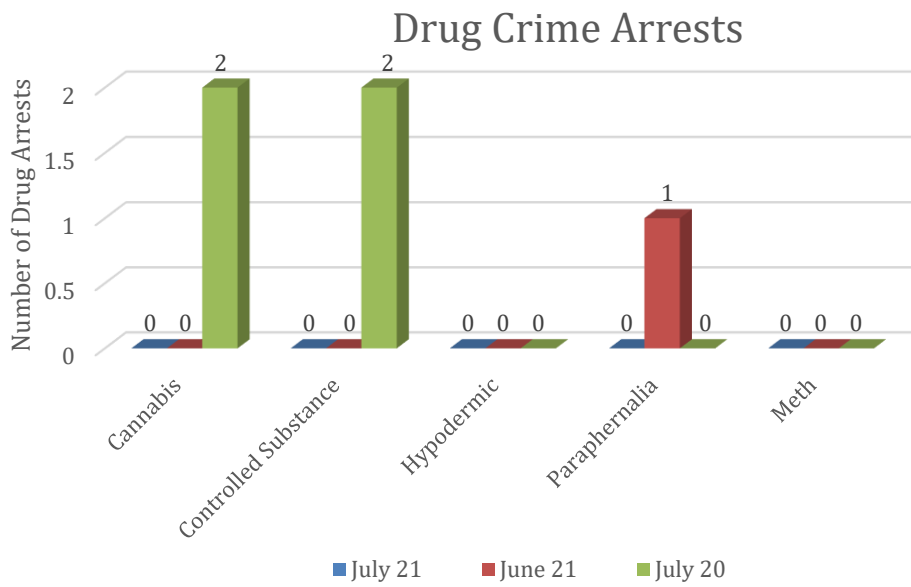
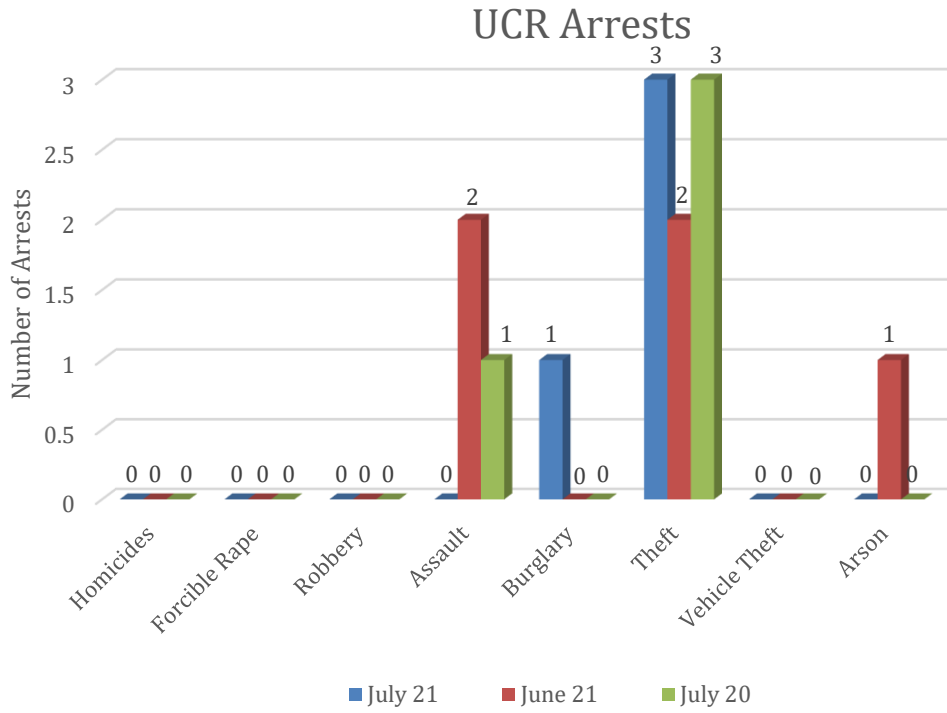
MONTHLY STATISTICS

UCR Report for July 2021





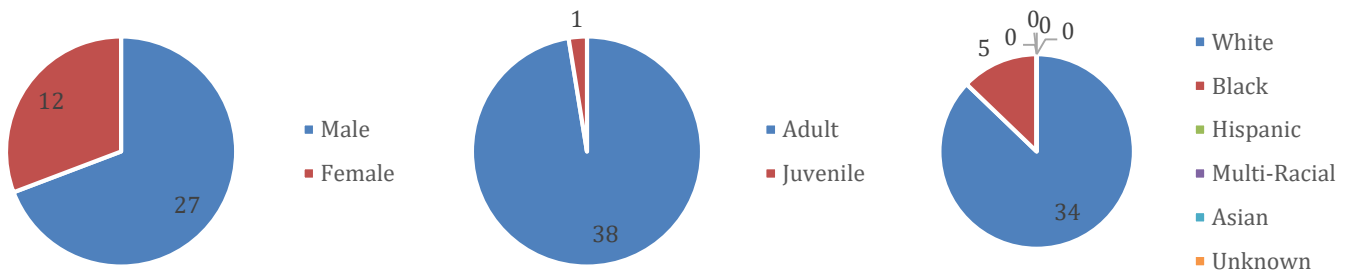

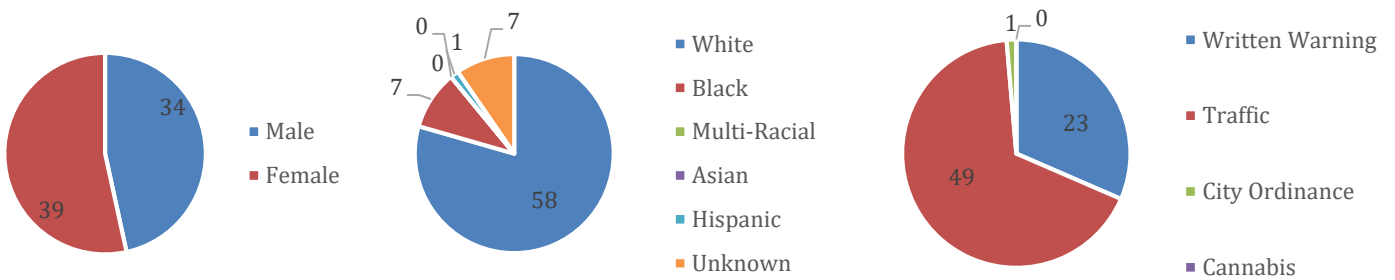

Criminal Investigations

The detectives of the Criminal Investigation Division of the Lincoln Police Department conducted further investigation on 15 active criminal investigations in the month of July. The types of investigations are listed but due to the sensitivity of those investigations, specific information is not available for release.
